 - h. Criminal Justice Coordinator Dillon Ksionek and Chair Clendenning Review of both Dept. of Justice grant funding for diversion courts, as well as grant funding of jail programming and their effect on FTE count and services.
 - i. District Attorney Jonathan Barnett & Chair Clendenning Review of additional FTEs coinciding with additional ADAs the state is providing.

Letter of Comments - October 2025

- This year, I had to compute and forward the Library Tax exemption formulas to those municipalities that have libraries in their respective jurisdictions. This task used to be completed by the South Central Library System, but apparently they are not able to do this any longer. After I computed those amounts, I passed them along to the municipalities so they knew what they had to budget in order to claim exemption from the county library tax. These calculations are all formula based and work off circulation, costs, and equalized values. It reminds me of a miniapportionment process.
- Along with the library tax exemption rates, I will also be working on the apportionment of taxes and getting those out as soon as the state certifies the charge back amounts they may have. Once the county has final tax numbers, work will commence on those calculations. Unfortunately, the state does not certify the charge back numbers until the day the apportionment is due, which is idiotic and makes no sense, but, as that lovely Doris Day song goes......que sera, sera.
- Construction of a pressure relief outlet continues in our back storage area. It takes up a nice chunk of space. As of this writing, it is in place, framed out, and in the process of being drywalled and painted. Once complete, we will be bringing down all the items we have stored up in the storage area of the county board room, if there is room.
- ES&S was here the first week of September to conduct preventative maintenance on all of our voting machines in the county. All the clerks dropped off their equipment and we locked it all in the storage area in the county board room, where the maintenance was performed. The room served us well for this process in that the technicians were able to use the county board desks that have power to them to hook up a number of units at once.
- I had ES&S Technical Services here to move the election servers from the county's data center to our programming room. This is a more secure process for us when it comes to elections in that only my office staff and myself have access to our programming room and its contents. Myself, along with Chief Deputy County Clerk DeKleyn, will be going through the training for the self-programming of elections. Our ES&S representative will be onsite for at least two full days to start and then return for additional training as we get closer to an election. Again, with the scrutiny of elections and the various processes involved, it just makes sense to have the statutory chief election official (that would be me) of the county perform this task. While I believe this move to be neutral as far as costs go, it does allow us some flexibility on printing and special election costs, which could see some cost saving associated with it.
- I attended the WCA Conference at the Kalahari at the end of September. Recall, this also serves as the fall meeting of the county clerks, so I was not able to attend many of the breakout sessions. I did attend one on Constitutional Officers put on by Andy Phillips. He did a great job of explaining

the various nuances involved when it comes to counties and their constitutional officers. Our sessions were interesting as well. It is always good to get together with my fellow clerks and learn together, and the Kalahari is a great place to hold these meetings and conferences.

- I have training set up for my municipal clerks and chief election inspectors on Wednesday, October 22nd and Saturday, October 25th, at the Community Hall in Pittsville. If history holds, I should have close to 100 attending on Wednesday and about 30-40 on Saturday. I limit attendance to just those two groups with instructions to take back what they learn to the other election inspectors. If I were to let everyone attend, I would need a place like the Kalahari to accommodate the number of people we have. I am very grateful to the City of Pittsville for letting me use the hall free of charge for these activities. I have submitted my training and been approved for 3 hours of training credit. Since I have been county clerk, I have offered Saturday sessions because a lot of my clerks and some chiefs work during the week and having the Saturday sessions allows them to gain their 6 hours per term required training to remain certified in elections for the next term, which begins on January 1, 2026, without having to take a day off of work.
- I had to go to one more session of training to remain as a state certified trainer for chief election inspector baseline training and municipal clerk core training. This process was more involved than in the past in that I had to attend additional trainings that were not required in the past. Fortunately, I was able to do 2 of them via Zoom, but I did have to truck up to River Falls to attend one of them, as it was not offered via Zoom.

Human Resources Narrative

General Highlights

- 1. Began the Open Enrollment process for 2026 benefit elections including finalizing the Benefits Guide, the Open Enrollment presentation slides, and premium amounts. Again this year we are pleased to offer an electronic benefit election form through Employee Self Service (ESS). Open enrollment meetings are scheduled to take place the week of September 29th with both in-person and virtual attendance options. All benefit-eligible employees are encouraged to attend a meeting or view a recorded session (when available) as there are some important changes being announced, including:
 - Health Insurance premiums are increasing by 5% for 2026
 - Out-of-Pocket maximums on the Traditional PPO plan are increasing slightly: Deductible & Coinsurance: \$1,500 Individual, \$4,500 Family
 - A specialty medication tier (Tier 4) is being added to the Traditional PPO plan at a \$150 copay
 - OptiMed Specialty Pharmacy benefit is being added that provides free specialty medications to plan members
 - Dependent Care FSA contribution limit is increasing to \$7,500 per family

- Employees may earn Wellness points for their attendance by logging into the ManageWell portal and completing the required information. All benefit eligible employees must complete and return an enrollment form by November 7th.
- 2. Earlier this month, we were notified by The Horton Group and Anthem that negotiations with Aspirus Health System are ongoing but have not yet resulted in an agreement. We are hopeful that an agreement will be reached, allowing continued access to these local facilities, however if an agreement is not reached towards the end of the year, we will evaluate all available options due to the significant disruption this will cause our members. We will continue to monitor the negotiations and share any new information when it becomes available.
- 3. Continued engagement with Mid-State Technical College on both our annual Leadership Retreat and the Employee Engagement Survey.
 - The Leadership Retreat will take place on Thursday, November 13th and will focus on Building High Functioning Teams, Team Problem Solving, and AI Leadership. All Wood County managers and supervisors and invited and encouraged to attend!
 - The survey questions have been finalized and MSTC is currently building our survey in an electronic platform. A January 2026 launch date is anticipated. The survey will be optional and intended for all Wood County employees.

Topics presented included Behavioral Health Solutions, the WI Retirement System, the Arbitration and IHO Process Preparation, Best Practices in Workers' Compensation, Conducting Investigations, and Navigating HR Landmines.
- 6. Attended the monthly conference call with The Horton Group on September 23rd to discuss various benefit topics, including the 2026 renewal process.
- 7. Attended the WPELRA Member Roundtable on September 24th.
- 8. Held individual staff and team meetings to discuss and provide updates on the department's identified 2025 goals.
- 9. Team members attended various webinars related to benefits, employment law, and compliance.

- I have been conducting body composition testing this past month via the InBody analysis machine to various locations. Employees had the opportunity to get measurements of fat mass/percentage, skeletal muscle mass, lean dry mass, and water weight.
- I have been working with public health nursing for the upcoming flu shot clinic in October; they have been a tremendous help in organizing and staffing these upcoming clinics. There will be two clinics days at Riverblock in Wisconsin Rapids, and one clinic held at DC Steinle Plaza in Marshfield. Sign-ups are ready and an initial communication to employees has been sent.

1. Chair Rozar called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM and declared a quorum present.

- 2. Under public comment, Chair Rozar reported that Administrator Kornack delivered a healthy baby boy and both are doing very well. Congratulations expressed by the committee and those in attendance.
- The consent agenda was reviewed with inquiries being addressed. Motion by Buttke/Hokamp to approve the consent agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 4. Public Health Nursing Supervisor Erica Sherman, along with staff of the Health Department, provided an update and overview on the Family Health Injury Prevention Program as well as the Maternal Health Program for the committee.
- 5. The committee reviewed changes to the 2026 budgets of the departments they oversee and noted and acted on the following:
 - a. Edgewater Haven Administrator Cieslewicz reported and error in the Medicare formula which necessitated changes to the proposed budget. The formula error resulted in an approximate \$82,000 addition to the levy request than what was originally proposed, but this is still well below the ask of 2025. Motion by Buttke/Topping to approve the amended Edgewater Haven budget. Motion carried unanimously.
 - b. An inquiry was brought forth from the Operations Committee regarding whether or not the county was maximizing usage of the administrative fees from the opioid settlement dollars. The Opioid Settlement Task force has not been open to this as of yet. Motion by Valenstein/Hokamp to transfer \$12,780 of the opioid settlement dollars to offset personnel costs for the 2026 budget. Motion carried unanimously.
 - c. Human Service Director Vruwink stated that they are looking for additional revenues/cost savings within the other Human Services

budget as directed by the Operations Committee. More information will be forthcoming as the budget is finalized.

- 6. Vruwink provided an update on the Norwood water system replacement and hopes to have numbers by the end of October.
- 7. Cieslewicz reported the bid for the conduit cleanout came in from E-Con for \$54,417, which was lower than expected. Once the entire project is complete, a resolution to amend the budget to cover these costs will need to be drafted.
- 8. Vruwink and Health Department Director Smith presented tuition reimbursement requests for employees in each of their respective departments who are eligible. Motion by Buttke/Valenstein to approve the tuition reimbursement requests as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- Vruwink presented a resolution requesting state funding to offset federal funding cuts to counties for the SNAP Program. Motion by Buttle/Golemgeski to approve the resolution and forward it onto the county board for their consideration. Motion carried unanimously.

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of North Central Community Action Program, Inc. was held on Monday, August 11, 2025, at the Community Partners Campus. The meeting was called to order at 6:02 pm by President Jennifer Lemmer.

Guests: Diane introduced our new Board member, Michelle Kearns, Compliance Manager at Prevail Bank. Staff and Board members introduced themselves.

Minutes: Jennifer Lemmer asked if there were any changes or questions. A motion was made by Laura Valenstein to accept the June minutes as presented. Second was made by Matt Zacher. Motion carried.

Approval of June/July expenses: Pam reviewed the financial statements. Pam reported we did not need the line of credit and will not need it now until at least June of 2026. It appears the AmeriCorps program caused our largest cash flow issues and we no longer operate that program so it alleviated our cash flow issues. Pam reported the Other Liabilities account is larger at the end of June due to closing out the weatherization contract and accruals for June payroll and PTO that gets allocated to the contract closing on June 30th. The remaining other liability amount is the first and second quarter pension accruals. Pam reviewed the statement of revenue and expenditures. Beneficiary expenses are higher as with contracts that overlap years, the beneficiary amounts are always higher with new calendar year united way budgets. There are also increased costs due to higher PSH and TBRA funding. Our insurance costs have increased with the higher contractor payments as well as the purchase of two new vehicles. Motion was made by Steve Robinson to approve the financial statements as presented. Second was made by Joe Dorava. Motion carried.

Point in Time update: Diane discussed the point in time homeless count requirement. Diane reported 5 homeless were found on the street in Wausau and an additional 5 they could count from the Salvation Army; none were found in Marshfield or Merrill; and 2 were found in Wisconsin Rapids. Mandy Lang asked how our counts compared to last year and Diane explained only 3 were found on the street in

Wausau during the last count. There were many found in vehicles, however, those can no longer be counted. Diane reported the shelter counts totaled about 61. Lenore Breit asked if there was additional space above the 61 and Diane explained there were additional beds if needed. Steve Robinson asked if the Bridge Street mission was counted and Diane explained they couldn't be counted as they are faith based.

CSBG application 2026: Diane distributed and reviewed the 2026 CSBG application and the 2024 annual report. We are requesting \$287,501 for 2026. Diane explained we need CSBG funding as many of our housing programs do not have adequate staffing dollars and no funding for office space, phones, supplies, etc.. which is all covered by our Community Services Block Grant. Motion was made by Steve Robinson to approve the application as presented. Second was made by Christine Vorpagel. Motion carried.

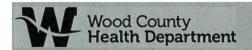
WHEAP applications: Diane reported the State DEHCR staff contacted us about administering the Low-Income Energy Assistance program in Lincoln County. Tony discussed how it would work closely with our weatherization program.

Weatherization: Tony discussed the Weatherization program and processes from application to job completion. Tony explained to apply for weatherization you actually must apply for energy assistance as it is a dual application program. Tony understands the WHEAP staff taking applications are so busy they don't have time to do a lot of extra explaining about the weatherization program and that is one benefit of us taking the applications. Tony explained the energy audit, SIR savings to investment ratio calculations, limited baseload jobs, the deferral process, and homeowner and renter differences. Christine Vorpagel asked about the different types of insulation and Tony explained the different insulation measures we complete.

Board Elections: The slate of officers is as follows: Lenore Breit, President; Jennifer Lemmer Vice-President; and Mandy Lang for Secretary/Treasurer. Steve Robinson made a motion to close nominations and cast a unanimous ballot for Lenore Breit as Board President, Jennifer Lemmer as Vice President, and Mandy Lang as Secretary/Treasurer. Second was made by Christine Vorpagel. Motion carried.

ADMINISTATIVE REPORT - SUE SMITH, RN, MSN, CPM

- I would like to extend my deepest sympathy to Supervisor Hokamp for the loss of his mom, Marion. Marion served on the Wood County Board for many years and was a member of the Board of Health for many years as well. She was a wonderful lady and a joy to work alongside.
- Safe Haven Baby Box: The city attorney has been working on a contract with the SHBB organization. There seem to be a few hiccups. I attended the Finance Committee meeting, and they did direct legal counsel to enter into a contract with the SHBB organization, so it appears it is moving forward. Linda Casper and I met with Sue Schill, the city attorney, to talk through ways we can support the city as this moves forward. We will begin fundraising soon and are seeking out an organization to serve as a fiscal agent and hold the funds, pay expenses, etc. Linda Casper and I were interviewed by James for a WFHR Rapids Report (thank you to Supervisor Penzkover for setting that up). - **Opioid Settlement:** The current balance remains at \$374,336.43. We are working on scheduling a meeting of the Opioid Task Force to make some tweaks to our grantmaking process and then put out a request for applications. We plan to present the task force recommendations for funding to HHSC in November and Operations and the County Board at their December meetings.

Legislative Update:

- There have been some confusing changes to **regulations of electronic vaping devices**. There is a state law (WI Statute 995.15) as well as federal regulations that were recently implemented that outlaw many vaping devices. Our local coalition is working on gathering clear information and I will share that when it is available. At the present time, local retailers are confused about specifics, and many are clearing out any devices that are clearly not allowed under the new regs. The Department of Revenue (DOR) is the enforcement agency for this law, and they have been communicating to retailers the requirements of this policy.
 - This is the definition of an electronic vaping device: "Electronic vaping device" means a device that may be used to deliver any aerosolized or vaporized liquid or other substance for inhalation, regardless of whether the liquid or other substance contains nicotine, including an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, vape pen, or e-hookah. "Electronic vaping device" includes a component, part, or accessory of the device, and includes a liquid or other substance that may be aerosolized or vaporized by such device, regardless of whether the liquid or other substance contains nicotine. "Electronic vaping device" does not include a battery or battery charger when sold separately.
 - Only products listed on the Electronic Vaping Device Directory are allowed in WI. The directory is created, maintained, and enforced by DOR. The policy was passed in 2023 through Act 73 and went into effect July 1, 2025. An update for electronic vaping devices that contain hemp was passed on July 3rd, 2025, through Act 15 (state budget). All electronic vaping devices must be listed on this directory to be sold in Wisconsin. However, appearance on the directory does not indicate a device complies with all applicable state, local, and federal laws.
 - Requirements of manufacturers of electronic vaping devices:
 - o Electronic vaping devices that are not hemp devices: By July 1, 2025, manufacturers of electronic vaping devices must submit a list of all products available for sale in Wisconsin and provide proof that these products have either (1) received marketing authorization order from the FDA; or (2) the device was marketed as of August 8, 2016 and they've submitted a Premarket Tobacco Product Application (PMTA) to the FDA and the application is still under review or a final decision on the application has not taken effect. Starting September 1, 2025, manufacturers and retailers will be fined \$1,000 per day for each device that is being offered or sold that is not listed on the directory.
 - o Electronic vaping devices that only contain hemp: Act 15 included changes to 995.15 related to requirements for hemp devices. DOR will be updating their publication document to reflect those changes. By July 1, 2026, manufacturers of electronic vaping devices that contain hemp and not nicotine must submit a list of all products available for sale in Wisconsin and provide a certificate of analysis from an independent laboratory showing that the electronic vaping device is a hemp device and does not contain nicotine. Starting September 1, 2026, manufacturers and retailers will be fined \$1,000 per day for each device that is being offered or sold that is not listed on the directory.
 - o Devices must be certified through DOR each year with a \$500 fee per device.
 - o The directory will be listed on DOR's Cigarette, Tobacco, and Vapor Products webpage and is available here: DOR Electronic Vaping Device Directory.
 - Electronic vaping device directories are being challenged around the country. A lawsuit was recently filed in Wisconsin. At this time, we don't know how this will impact the implementation and enforcement of the directory.
- We are also keeping an eye on the Assembly Bill and Senate Bill 192, which establishes fatality review teams under state law. The bills require the WI Department of Health Services (DHS) to develop a fatality review program and authorizes, but does not require, DHS to create state fatality review teams. The bill requires DHS to perform

various duties, in consultation with other state agencies as appropriate, such as: 1) facilitate local team development; 2) identify training needs and make available training resources; 3) provide technical assistance and support; 4) in the absence of a local team or upon request, assign review of deaths to a state fatality review team, if established; 5) educate the public on causes and recommendations for prevention of reviewable deaths; and 6) provide information to the legislature, state agencies, and local communities on the need for modifications to law, policy, or practice.

- The bill identifies examples of the types of deaths that may constitute a reviewable death, including overdose, suicide, maternal death occurring during or within a year of a pregnancy, or any unexpected or unintentional death of a child, among others.
- Under the bill, a fatality review team has the purpose of gathering information about reviewable deaths to examine risk factors and understand how deaths may be prevented, through identifying recommendations for cross-sector, system-level policy and practice changes, and promoting cooperation and coordination among the agencies involved in understanding causes of reviewable deaths or in providing services to surviving family members.
- The bill authorizes a fatality review team to access records from a variety of sources, such as certain state agencies, law enforcement, medical examiners and coroners, health care providers, social or human service agencies, schools, and the prescription drug monitoring program, among others, subject to certain restrictions under the bill and current law.
- Information and records provided to or created by a fatality review team are confidential, subject to limited exceptions provided under the bill, and are not subject to Wisconsin's public records laws.
- The bill also exempts fatality review team meetings from Wisconsin's open meetings law.
- Finally, we are tracking **AB and SB 211 The Tobacco Bar Bill**. As you might have heard, the <u>Tobacco Bar Bill</u> was on the floor for a vote in the Assembly on September 11. At first glance, some lawmakers think this bill simply creates a narrow exception for adults-only cigar bars. The reality is very different. Here is a summary: *This bill exempts* tobacco bars from the general prohibition under current law against smoking in indoor locations if the tobacco bar satisfies all of the following: 1) the tobacco bar came into existence on or after June 4, 2009; 2) only the smoking of cigars and pipes is allowed in the tobacco bar; and 3) the tobacco bar is not a retail food establishment. Current law defines a "tobacco bar" as a tavern that generates 15 percent or more of its annual gross income from the sale on the tavern premises, other than from a vending machine, of cigars and pipe tobacco. Also, under current law, tobacco bars that existed on June 3, 2009, are exempt from the general prohibition against smoking in indoor locations.
 - This legislation creates a significant loophole in Wisconsin's 15-year strong, extremely popular smoke-free air law.
 - It does not grant local control, meaning communities cannot limit or regulate so-called "tobacco bars."
 - It risks increased secondhand smoke exposure in public places.
 - It puts service workers back in unsafe conditions.
 - It introduces confusion into what has been a clear, effective law that has protected health for years.
 - Here is more educational information from the Partnership for Tobacco Free Wisconsin.

SUPERVISOR OF STRATEGIC INITIATIVES REPORT - KRISTIE RAUTER EGGE. MPH

- Staff conducted an employee input survey to assess employee satisfaction, well-being, and workplace culture and refined a process for staff to create individual development plans for workforce development purposes.
- Staff updated employee orientation checklist and are working on an internal Strategic Planning workgroup.
- Staff are serving as a mentor for a group of 3 residents in the N2PH (New to Public Health) residency program.

Communication/Branding

- Staff continue to attend and provide support to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services Communications Strategy Workgroup meetings. Staff, met with the Leadership Team to plan the Statewide Public Health Public Information Officer Network meeting.
- Staff provided updates for the HPWC website and facilitated an internal WCHD Communications Committee meeting.
- Handouts for Healthy People Wood County have been created for staff and partners to utilize to help communicate and share information, current Community Health Improvement initiatives, efforts, and details about the Advisory Council.
- Staff published new pages to the Healthy People Wood County website. Visit healthypeoplewoodcounty.org to explore information, initiatives, and support aimed at enhancing community health.

Community Health Improvement Plan Work

- The Healthy People Wood County Advisory Council convened in September. This meeting included a partner presentation on 2-1-1 data and updates on the Community Health Improvement Plan and other initiatives.
- Dissemination and implementation of the Improvement Plan is ongoing through a variety of channels, including actively
 engaging with elected officials, conducting outreach to municipalities and villages, facilitating group discussions, holding
 one-on-one meetings, and sharing at community events. We invite partners and organizations interested in learning
 more about the action plan or exploring potential collaboration opportunities to connect with us to schedule a meeting or
 presentation.
- Staff meetings are currently ongoing to review and update the 2025-2027 Community Health Improvement Monitoring and Evaluation plan, ensuring it reflects current efforts and resources.
- Ongoing meetings and engagement with partner health systems are taking place to align efforts and outline future collaborative initiatives.
- Staff are serving as a preceptor for a UW-Madison DNP student who will be working on the access to care CHIP priority.

Mental Health

- Meetings with partners and organizations are being held to align efforts, foster collaboration, and provide support.
- Activities outlined in the action plan are being implemented to address the use of technology and social media on youth mental health, social isolation, and loneliness, and the impact of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs).
- Staff participated in the MACY Mental Health Task Force Meeting. The task force is actively engaged in strategic
 planning and identifying the needs of Marshfield youth to develop strategies and initiatives to impactfully move forward
 with.
- Staff attended the Prevent Suicide Wisconsin Coalition meeting to learn about the Wisconsin Suicide Prevention Plan, strategies, best practices, resources, and recommended actions for suicide prevention.
- Throughout September, we recognized Suicide Prevention Awareness Month by creating awareness social media posts and writing an article for the Pittsville Record.
- Staff attended the Commit to Connect Annual National Summit to Increase Social Connections. This summit brings together local, state, and national leaders from across sectors to address social isolation.

Financial Security

Staff met with partners to discuss incorporating financial security into employee wellness programs and orientation processes.

Farmer's Market

On Saturday, August 16, a severe weather event struck the downtown farmer's market, causing significant damage. Despite closely monitoring weather advisories, the storm arrived more quickly and with greater intensity than expected. As a result, many vendors experienced losses to both product and equipment. Still, the month of August brought many positives. We welcomed 69 vendors and several local businesses, filing the market with fresh food, handmade goods, and the warm presence of our community. Here a quick look at the impact for August:

- \$1,112 in Debit/Credit transactions
- \$984 in SNAP/EBT transactions
- \$240 in SNAP/EBT Double Dollar Match benefits
- \$220 in Aspirus Fruit and Veggies RX redemptions
- \$59,927 in total vendor sales

USDA Regional Farmers Market Collaboration

- Staff organized and hosted our Central WI Farmers Market Collaborative bimonthly virtual meeting with guests from Manitowoc County to share information about the efforts to reduce food waste and donate healthy food to pantries from farmers markets (gleaning).
- Staff entered and collected data for our Farm2Fact portal, hosted a treasurer training for the Waupaca Farmers Market, attended partner meetings with: PartnersHP, Wisconsin Nutrition Initiative (WINI), created updated marketing materials for Farmers Market of Wausau: A Frame sign & banner, were awarded \$6,000 in grant funds to assist Wood County Farmers Markets through the CEED committee, and completed a Farmers Market Information Booth Process Document for the Stevens Point Farmers Market in conjunction with Graduate students.

Safe Kids Wood and Clark Counties

- Staff completed Department of Transportation (DOT)/car seat reporting. Staff held a child death review meeting and entered the case information into our case reporting system.
- A mock drunk driving car crash will be held on October 1 at Pittsville for their homecoming week. A helicopter will be flying in. Robin (another coordinator of Safe Kids- took Liz's spot) with Marshfield Clinic has been planning this event.
- Staff completed training via webinars focused on teen driving as we are trying to target that with homecomings coming up and school starting.

<u>Housing</u>

Staff researched housing strategies to support people who are homeless. A connection was made with a business owner in the community who wants to support this work.

Substance Use

- LifePoint Program: LifePoint is a satellite syringe service program of Vivent Health in which participants receive resources, overdose reversal medication, and sterile supplies needed to reduce their risk of injury and harm while using substances. Most participants of the program are living with a substance use disorder and share about the struggles they face every day. There were two program participants in August who additionally helped nine others with supplies and resources from the program.
- Marshfield Area Coalition for Youth (MACY): The MACY Drug Task Force continued strategic planning in August to
 complete the working action plan for Year 2 of the Drug Free Communities (DFC) Support program for northern Wood
 County (Marshfield, Hewitt, Arpin, and Auburndale). The plan focuses on upstream youth prevention of alcohol, nicotine,
 and THC use. The Drug Task Force also had a display booth at the Central Wisconsin State Fair in Marshfield, which
 was an opportunity to educate people about what MACY is and the work the group does.

- Overdose Fatality Review (OFR) Team: The Wood County OFR Team met for the first time in August to talk through
 individual fatality cases that will shed light on ways the community can prevent future fatalities. Partners from across the
 county met to discuss a case from multiple perspectives including responding agencies, case investigators, and any
 other agencies who may have interreacted with the decedent. A unique element of OFR cases is Next of Kin interviews
 to help the team understand the decedent's life story. This group will determine how future meetings will be structured,
 as the first meeting was paired with the Child Death Review Team.
- HOPE Consortium Conference: The substance use team participated in the 9th Annual HOPE Consortium Virtual Conference August 7 and 8. The conference brought together various professionals in substance use-related fields for a two-day learning and networking opportunity focused on prevention, treatment, recovery, and risk reduction. The conference also offered five tracks on Ethics & Boundaries, Specific Substances, Professional Skills & Development, Community Engagement, and Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome. Pamela Lee, Community Health Worker with WCHD, presented on Wood County's six public health vending machines with co-presenters sharing about machines located in Portage, Taylor, and Jackson counties.
- Northwoods Coalition (NWC):
 - NWC held a four-part virtual Opioid Academy that concluded with an in-person legislative breakfast on August 20. Wood County was invited to present a success story on our Opioid Settlement process where several community coalitions from northwestern Wisconsin were in attendance. Ashley Normington (Public Health Strategist, WCHD) and Elizabeth Walter (Executive Director, Three Bridges Recovery) shared information from the Opioid Task Force. Wisconsin Department of Health Services Director of Substance Use Initiatives, Michelle Haese, also presented, providing an overview of the opioid landscape in Wisconsin. Langlade County reached out following the presentation, as they would like to replicate a similar process to what Wood County has in place.
- NWC held a virtual member meeting in August with a presentation from the Wisconsin DNR on why the DNR should be at the coalition table. The presenter shared alarming information about trends they are seeing with alcohol use and ATV/UTV operators, including underage individuals operating while intoxicated. Maureen Busalacchi, Medical College of Wisconsin and Alcohol Policy Project, shared information about the federal budget process.
- Public Health Vending Machines: Wood County vended a total of 441 resources from Public Health Vending Machines.
 The River Block Building machine remains the most used machine in Wood County. Top supplies vended were
 Naloxone, vending 88 boxes, followed by 53 wound care kits and 45 menstrual pads.
- Providers and Teens Communicating for Health (PATCH): The new PATCH Site Coordinator, Pamela Lee, completed the 20-hour Teen Consultant training. Additionally, five amazing teens will start offering free Teen Consulting to organizations in Wood County and the surrounding counties to anyone looking to have youth voices at the table.
- IMPACT Community Team Meeting: The full IMPACT community team met on August 12. A representative from the Wisconsin Wellness Council provided a mental health training session titled "Make It Okay" to the team. During the meeting, the team discussed data fact sheets and the upcoming 2025 Community Opinions Survey on Alcohol and Other Drugs. The team will meet again on November 11.
- Alcohol Workgroup: The workgroup compiled mid-year data regarding the Place of Last Drink (POLD), identifying
 locations mentioned in alcohol-related incidents as places where individuals had their last drink. This data supports the
 coalition and law enforcement in addressing over-serving and preventing harms related to excessive alcohol use.
 Members presented on the process for Wood County's Place of Last Drink at the 2025 Wisconsin Governor's
 Conference on Highway Safety. The presentation assisted other counties across the state in implementing data
 collection and developing educational and outreach strategies.
- School Orientation: IMPACT members set up booths at Nekoosa, Port Edwards, and Wisconsin Rapids High Schools.
 These booths offered informational materials about the IMPACT substance prevention coalition, along with data on the
 use of nicotine, alcohol, and THC in Wood County. Members engaged with students, parents, and teachers to share
 information about the IMPACT coalition, provided resources, and encouraged participation in coalition efforts.
- THC Committee: Members of the committee met with local THC retailers to gain an understanding of what materials and resources would be beneficial for retailers to prevent youth access and to comply with age restrictions on sales to individuals 21 and over. Wisconsin Rapids adopted the Wood County hemp derivative ordinance language in July of 2025, which has now been adopted by all municipalities in Wood County. This ordinance restricts the sale of hemp-derived psychoactive products to individuals 21 years of age and older, and these products cannot be sold within 750 feet of a youth gathering location. The committee has begun discussions with law enforcement about conducting compliance checks in Wood County to ensure all retailers are following the ordinance. Staff created a summary report of THC survey results for Pittsville

Transportation and Recreation

- Catch a Ride: Staff finalized Central Wisconsin Catch a Ride's Pledge Form to share out to the public and potential donors for the program and continued work with a UWSP student to collect local transportation data. Staff met with Mid-State Technical College staff to discuss potential grants and partnerships to apply for transportation projects and created a comparison chart for Catch a Ride services compared to other existing transportation in Wood County.
- River Riders Bike Share and Marshfield Area Bike Share: River Riders Bike Share hosted their annual fall community bike ride with Sheriff Becker on Wednesday, September 10 at South Wood County Park White Sands Beach Lake Wazeecha. Photo to come next month! The season continues in Marshfield and Wisconsin Rapids throughout the month of October. Planning is taking place to implement a community-wide survey at the end of the season to hear from the community about our program.

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ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH REPORT - BEN JEFFREY, R.S.

New Businesses and Consultations

A pre-licensing inspection was completed for The Market in Pittsville. A consultation was completed for a mobile food establishment in the Wisconsin Rapids area. Environmental health staff also completed Standardization with the Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection last month. This exercise ensures our inspections are in line with inspectors across the state of Wisconsin.

Complaint Investigations

Eight complaint investigations were completed in the month of August.

- A complaint was received regarding solid waste and tires being disposed of on a property. Environmental health staff
 were onsite and took photographs of the property from the road. No public health violations were noted, but some
 abandoned vehicles, tires, and boats were observed.
- A caller reported poor handwashing at a licensed food establishment. Environmental health staff conducted an onsite complaint inspection and reviewed proper handwashing practices.
- A complaint was received regarding cockroaches and garbage on a rental property. Environmental health staff spoke with both the tenant and landlord in this situation. Garbage has been picked up and professional pest control has been scheduled for the cockroaches.
- A caller reported an illness after eating at a licensed food establishment. Environmental health staff conducted an onsite
 complaint inspection and discussed the complaint with the operator. No ill staff were onsite, nor any other illnesses
 reported.
- A complaint was received regarding a food worker sneezing into his or her hand. Environmental health staff visited the establishment and reviewed proper handwashing practices with the manager.
- A complaint was received regarding poor living conditions inside a home. Environmental health staff conducted an onsite inspection of the property. No public health hazards were noted at the time of inspection.
- A complaint was received regarding poor bathroom conditions inside a licensed food establishment. Environmental health staff were onsite, but the bathrooms had since been cleaned. EH Staff discussed the complaint with management.
- A complaint was received regarding a lack of maintenance in a rental unit. Environmental health staff explained that it was not a public health hazard, and the tenant needs to reach out to property management.

HEALTHY SMILES FOR WOOD COUNTY REPORT - NICOLE BURLINGAME, RDH

Healthy Smiles was awarded \$31,350.00 from Wisconsin Seal-A-Smile for the 2025/2026 school year. Oral screenings and fluoride varnish for Head Start Centers will start this later this month.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE SUPERVISOR REPORT - ERICA SHERMAN, MSN. RN. IBCLC

Family Health/Parents as Teachers (PAT)

- PAT hosted a Splash into Summer event on August 14 in Wisconsin Rapids. PAT families gathered at the splash pad to learn about water safety and enjoy social networking with other families.
- The PAT team continues to work in partnership with Human Services to host Parent Cafes. Two cafes were hosted in August titled Backyards to Backpacks. Trained café hosts guided discussions focused on a smooth transition back to school. Both events (one in Marshfield, one in Wisconsin Rapids) were a great success with several families participating in each event.
- The PAT program is currently accepting new families. Referrals can be made at: https://form.jotform.com/wchd8911/pat-registration-form
- Families interested in any family health service offered at the health department can also complete an interest form at: https://form.jotform.com/wchd8911/interest-form

Maternal-Child Health (MCH)

- WellTAP: The MCH team has resumed offering fee-exempt well water testing to eligible families. This program has been
 revitalized and rebranded by Wisconsin DHS as WellTAP. To qualify for WellTAP, all of the following criteria must be
 met:
 - The well serves someone who is pregnant, a child 12 or under, or a person with weakened immune system.
 - The well serves your primary residence.
 - A financial or other burden prevents you from testing on your own.
 - Qualified well users can request a sample kit, and it will be analyzed by the Wisconsin State Lab of Hygiene.
- Lactation Support: We have increased the number of hospital-grade breast pumps available through our pump rental program. Individuals needing lactation support can schedule an appointment with a certified lactation professional for services via phone or in-person (office or home). Support services include breastfeeding education and support, weight monitoring, feeding assessment, troubleshooting, resources, and assistance obtaining necessary supplies.

Communicable Disease (CD)

- We are advising residents to continue to protect themselves against mosquito bites as we have identified this year's first human case of West Nile virus in a resident of Wood County. West Nile virus activity has been detected in other parts of Wisconsin this year, including other human cases as well as mosquitoes and animals.
- Wisconsin's measles outbreak has grown to 24 cases. All 24 cases are unvaccinated. Two have been hospitalized. We have had no measles activity in Wood County thus far.

Emergency Preparedness (EP)

- The Health Department's emergency preparedness efforts have focused on strengthening our communicable disease
 response and maintaining workforce readiness this month. Planning is underway for a measles discussion-based
 exercise with public health nurses to test surveillance, case investigation, and communication protocols. All staff are also
 completing refresher training on Incident Command System certifications to ensure we remain a competent and
 coordinated response team.
- In addition, we are closely monitoring the measles outbreak in Oconto County. Lessons learned from that response; particularly in rapid case identification, vaccination outreach, and public messaging—are being reviewed and incorporated into our local plans to enhance readiness and protect the health of our community.

WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC) REPORT - CAMEN HOFER, RD, CD, IBCLC

- The Farmers Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) usually starts June 1 but was delayed until July 1 due to a decrease in program funding. WIC has issued 437 FMNP voucher packets valued at \$25 each to eligible WIC participants from July 1 through September 8 and will continue issuing through the end of September.
- WIC is partnering with MCH and Aspirus this year to help families gain additional access to farmers market produce through the Aspirus Fruit and Veggie Rx Program. We have issued 15 of these \$20 vouchers to eligible families with a determined need for additional access to local produce.
- We've had a drop in caseload over the past couple of months. There has been an increase in families that are ineligible for the WIC program due to no longer being eligible for BadgerCare and also an increase in families moving out of state and dropping off our WIC program. After discussing with our regional state WIC representative, we also discovered our Wood County WIC agency is experiencing higher categorical ineligibility meaning more children are aging out of the program compared to other WIC agencies in the state. We are actively working on reenrolling families that may have fallen off the program due to missed appointments and continuing outreach work with HMOs, schools, and health care providers.

Educational Points: Tobacco Bar Bills (July 10th, 2025)

New tobacco bar bills, Senate Bill 211 (<u>SB 211</u>) and Assembly Bill 211 (<u>AB 211</u>) were recently introduced in the WI state legislature. SB 211 was referred to the <u>Senate Committee on Government Operations</u>, <u>Labor and Economic Development</u> and AB 211 was referred to the <u>Assembly Committee on State Affairs</u> and passed the committee on 6/25/25.

This is similar to bills that were introduced last session. This law would weaken Wisconsin's Smoke-free Air Law, which has been in place since July 2010. Current law defines tobacco bars as any tavern that generates 15 percent or more of its annual gross income from cigar and/or pipe tobacco sales. Tobacco bars are currently only allowed if they existed before June 3, 2009. The proposed legislation would increase the number of places that could allow indoor smoking of cigars, brown cigarettes or pipe tobacco products by allowing any bar that meets the 15 percent sales threshold to become a tobacco bar. It prohibits retail food establishments from becoming tobacco bars.

Local municipalities do not really have the ability to keep tobacco bars out of their communities

- Cities, towns, and villages in Wisconsin will not entirely have the authority to keep tobacco bars out
 of their neighborhoods. According to Wis. Stat. § 134.65, local governments cannot deny tobacco
 retail licenses except for very narrow circumstances outlined in state law.
- This law does not require a separate license for tobacco bars, making them hard to track and the law hard to enforce. This means that it will be difficult for law enforcement to identify whether taverns meet the 15% sales threshold, enforce what products are being smoked, and ensure public health protections.
- This proposed law does not create a separate tobacco bar license. This license is the same one
 used for selling cigarettes in bars. But it doesn't clearly show which taverns are just selling
 cigarettes and which ones allow people to smoke cigars, pipe tobacco, or other products like brown
 cigarettes.
- The current smoke-free air law is straightforward and self-enforcing. The proposed bill would pose significant enforcement challenges. It allows taverns to operate as tobacco bars by simply obtaining a tobacco retailer license (the same license that gas station owners need to sell tobacco products). However, there is no mechanism to track these tobacco bars, as there is no separate tobacco bar license.
- Neither the current state law or proposed bill include any age restrictions for who can enter taverns.
 It would be up to each business whether or not people would need to be older than 21 years old to enter.

Allowing tobacco bars would create a loophole in Wisconsin's Smoke-free Air Law.

- These changes would weaken Wisconsin's current clean indoor air protections and degrade decades of progress in both reducing exposure to secondhand smoke and preventing tobacco use.
- For 15 years, Wisconsin's smoke-free air law has prohibited smoking in indoor public places and protected workers and customers. A loophole would undermine the law, create confusion, put people at risk of serious health issues, and force workers to choose between their health and a paycheck.
- Smoke from a cigarette or cigar can stay in a room for hours. Using ventilation does not get rid of secondhand smoke. This smoke can also impact neighboring businesses and buildings.
- Individuals who work at and visit Wisconsin's taverns and restaurants do so expecting a smokefree environment. If establishments become cigar bars, those employees and customers will be in a position where they must leave their employment (or, in a customer's case, stop visiting their favorite place to enjoy an Old Fashioned) to protect their health.
- This bill would weaken Wisconsin's smoke-free air law to allow cigar, brown cigarette and pipe tobacco smoking in so-called "tobacco bars." Current law defines a tobacco bar as a tavern that generates 15 percent or more of its annual gross income from the sale of cigars and pipe tobacco. While that percentage may seem significant, small taverns could pass that threshold relatively easily with the sale of just a few high-end cigars.
- Unlike Native American traditional tobacco, cigars contain the same toxic compounds and chemicals that are found in cigarette smoke. While respecting cultural traditions is important, it can't be at the expense of endangering other people's health.

Creating loopholes for indoor smoking would make the law difficult to enforce.

- Little cigars can be identical to cigarettes (some are even the same color as cigarettes), making it hard for employees and law enforcement officers to distinguish which products are being used by customers. There's no need to add this kind of confusion to what's currently a straightforward and self-enforcing law.
- Wisconsin would have to create new procedures to track the location and revenue of tobacco bars. This would be logistically difficult, expensive for taxpayers, and could create new red tape for all taverns.
- Wisconsin has not conducted compliance checks around indoor smoking in public spaces in 15 years because the law is self-enforcing and allows few exceptions for indoor smoking. The proposed change complicates the law, would require training for law enforcement, and would cost taxpayers.

Smoke-free indoor air in Wisconsin is widely supported and plays an important role in preventing tobacco use.

- Wisconsin's clean indoor air law is broadly popular, with 77.5% of Wisconsinites supporting the current law, 18.3% neither support nor oppose, and only 4.2% oppose the clean indoor air law.²
- We know there is no safe amount of secondhand smoke, and for 15 years, Wisconsin residents have enjoyed the protections of our smoke-free law.
- By chipping away at the protections provided through the smoke-free air law, we risk renormalizing smoking. Exposing our youth to a perceived "acceptable smoking culture" sends the
 wrong message and endangers the progress we've made in reducing youth tobacco use this
 last decade and a half.
- Tobacco is still the leading cause of preventable death in WI. The smoke-free air law is a critical component of the state's multi-pronged approach to reducing tobacco use and deaths due to smoking-related causes. Since 2010, adult smoking rates have dropped from 19% to 12% in 2023³. Smoking among youth has decreased significantly since the law's passage. From 2009 to 2023, the smoking rate of Wisconsin high schoolers has dropped from 17% to 3%.
- With public health funding facing cuts at the national level, it's critical to keep best practice
 health policies like the smoke-free air law in place to sustain progress made in reducing the
 impact of tobacco products on Wisconsin.

WOOD COUNTY HUMAN SERVICES DEPARTMENT REPORT September 2025

Director Update by Brandon Vruwink

The Operations Committee has invited the Human Services Department-Community and Norwood to their September 24 meeting to review the budgets. We will plan to attend the meeting and answer the Operations Committee's questions about our 2026 budget proposal. We will keep the Health and Human Services Committee informed of the outcome of this discussion.

Recruiting and retaining licensed mental health professionals remains a concern for us. The demand for mental health providers continues to rise, while there is a shortage of licensed staff. Within our department, we are required to have licensed staff provide supervision and to sign off on notes to ensure we are eligible for reimbursement from Medicaid. Currently, we are at the minimum staffing for licensed professionals. We have staff working on completing their hours for licensure, which will assist with backup in case staff retire or move on to other opportunities. I share this with the committee, so you are aware of this challenge. Looking to the future, we have several staff members who are nearing retirement age. To address this issue, we are working on an application to become designated as a Health Professional Shortage Area. (HPSA). We have worked through this process in the past, but were denied. With the changes over the past couple of years and the loss of professionals in Wood County, we are hopeful we can become a designated area. This designation would open up the opportunity for those licensed and practicing in Wood County to be eligible for Student Loan forgiveness. Many of those new to the field are carrying large student loans. If Wood County receives the HPSA determinations, it will assist us with our recruitment and retention efforts.

We were just informed of the out-of-home care rate increases for 2026. As expected, all of the rates have increased. Treatment Level Foster Care rates increased by 8.23%, Group homes by 4.55% and Residential Care Centers by 11.13%. We anticipated rate increases when working on our 2026 budget and have accounted for the increases. However, with rates continuing to rise every year and no additional funding included in the state budget, the increases are going to be a significant challenge moving forward.

The Wisconsin Counties Association has collaborated with NACO to hold virtual meetings with members of Congress to discuss the impact SNAP changes will have on counties in Wisconsin. I was recommended to sit on this panel by Chelsea Shanks from WCA. The meeting is an opportunity to provide data to Representative Van Orden on the cost shift to counties as a result of the passage of federal legislation.

I have also been asked to serve as a panelist for a virtual Q&A session about the changes to Medicaid and SNAP and how they may affect Wisconsin residents. The program is called "Wisconsin Knowledge Boost." The session will begin with Wisconsin Medicaid Director Bill Hanna providing an overview of the changes from a state-level perspective. Then, questions will be answered by the panelists. I look forward to this opportunity to learn more and also share my knowledge from a county perspective.

Family Services Update by Jodi Liegl

As we prepared for budget, we learned that with the evolving changes to facilities, there are differing interpretations with residential and corrections placements based on how they are coded and billed throughout the state. After consulting with fiscal, we determined that Corrections will only be facilities through Department of Corrections including Lincoln Hills, Copper Lake, Mendota, and GROW Academy. Residential treatment centers will encompass the traditional residential centers around the state such as Northwest Passage, Tomorrow's Children and Lad Lake as well as 180/360 programs and the new facility in Wisconsin RISE=UP. Given this, the one youth who was previously counted in the corrections line has been moved to the residential treatment center line as they are placed at the RISE=UP facility.

Moving forward, the Secure Detention line will represent the number of youth who served time in secure detention throughout the month. Rarely, do we place youth in secure detention. It is more common for youth to be sanctioned to secure detention short-term if they are non-compliant with their court order or commit additional crimes while on juvenile supervision. In the month of July, we had four different youth serve time in secure detention for a total of 22 days. In the month of August, we had one youth serve time in secure detention for a total of five days.

Our team recognizes the costs for out of home placement, specifically restrictive placements, and the significant impact it has on the overall budget. We work diligently to prevent sending youth to restrictive placements by addressing their needs in the community and creating programs/services to prevent placement needs. As we were reviewing our internal data, we learned in 2023, the Youth Justice team had 27 youth placed in out of home care. In 2024, the Youth Justice team had 16 youth placed in out of home care. So far in 2025, we have had 11 youth placed in out of home care. As we interpret these declining numbers, we concluded that the services and work being done is having a positive impact on our youth. Unfortunately, the costs of placements have significantly increased, and it is becoming more challenging to place youth especially when they have high needs. This has resulted in the team having to place youth outside of the state in facilities that are extremely costly.

Education/Training Opportunity: On July 15, 2025, the Youth Justice team met with members from Department of Children and Families (DCF), Children's Court Improvement Program (CCIP), and our court partners for an

introductory training into Tailored Dispositional Orders project which is a research-based approach. The child protection teams went through a similar training in 2022 have been using the conditions developed through this process since implementation in 2023. The tailored conditions capture the specific behavior changes needed to ensure child and community safety, thus assisting families and youth to successfully exit the formal system. Through this project and review of the current court ordered conditions used in Wood County, the team will ensure the expectations are clearly and plainly written at a reading level that youth can understand, focus on the underlying issues, are measurable, defines behavioral and cognitive changes, and concentrates on the required changes necessary to end court ordered supervision. Specifically in youth justice, adolescent brain development research suggests tailored conditions reduce rates of incarceration for violations of conditions and reduce the length of supervision of youth. Furthermore, research indicates a combination of rewards and sanctions is best to promote success towards achieving goals, promoting incentives, and maintaining conditions that are certain, immediate, proportionate, and fair.

Personnel: We welcomed Daryl Green to the team. She is our newest child protective services ongoing case manager in our Marshfield office. We continue to actively recruit for a child protective services initial assessment worker.

Youth Diversion Update by Angela O'Day

Parent Cafés- The Wisconsin Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board awarded Human Services a \$30,000 supplemental primary prevention grant to bring community Parent Cafes to Wood County between 7/1/25-6/30/26. The grant is renewable for two years. Parent Cafes are based on the five protective factors that represent essential qualities and resources that families need to support the well-being of their children and deal more effectively with the challenges and stresses of life. The five protective factors are social and emotional competence of children, knowledge of parenting and child development, social connections, parental resilience, and concrete support in times of need. Parent cafes are not typical parent education. Parent cafes engage parent participants in learning about the protective factors through deep self-reflection and peer to peer learning. The grant focus is parents of children 0-5, but all Wood County parents are welcome to attend. A long-term goal of this initiative is to reduce the number of young people involved in the youth justice system. There is a strong connection between youth justice involvement and prior child welfare system experience. By providing support to caregivers in the early years, childhood trauma can be mitigated and the parent's capacity to nurture their child is increased which supports the healthy development of the child and the adolescent. The five protective factors promotes modeling and teaching social-emotional skills to children, supports healthy family communication, and empowers parents to reach out for help from outside supports when it is needed.

Parent Café Host two-day training was completed in early August through Be Strong Families. Twenty participants from Human Services, the Health Department, as well as several community partners became certified hosts. Twenty-four cafes will be offered throughout Wood County between 7/1/25-6/30/26. Each café will have a unique theme and protective factor focus. The theme of our first two cafes was routine and back to school transitions. Nine participants attended in Wisconsin Rapids, and 11 participants attended in Marshfield.

Community Art Project- The youth programming teams (ADP, TPOP, 4Sight, and Youth Mentors) worked with Rise Up Central Wisconsin to install a teen focused exterior mural in Wisconsin Rapids in August. The mural is painted on the side of the Parent Engagement Center facing Wisconsin Rapids City Hall. The mural depicts a flower garden, watering can, and the Youth Mentor program tagline "Your life, your future." The image reminds community members to invest time and resources into their goals and to make time to picture a positive future for themselves. Youth completed a series of 8 workshops to brainstorm images for the mural, helped create splatter paint features for the final mural image, and supported the mural installation.



Employment and Training Programs Update by Lacey Piekarski

On 7/30/25, the FoodShare Employment & Training (FSET) Program hosted DHS for an annual on-site visit at our Portage County FSET office. The monitoring included review of recorded customer appointments provided in advance, in-person shadowing of customer appointments with FSET case managers, and discussion with the FSET leadership team. In addition, we reviewed contractual requirements of the FSET Program, which have been met by the NorthCentral FSET Program in the following areas (05/2025 data):

- 1. Percent of FSET Customers Assigned to Education and Training Activities: 41.70% (Benchmark: 25%)
- 2. Participation Rate in the FSET Program: 67.49% (Benchmark: 40%)
- 3. Timely Contacting of Referred Customers to FSET: 100% (Benchmark: 95%)
- 4. Customers Enrolling in FSET (Enrollment to Referral) Ratio: 39.76% (Benchmark: 25%)

Best practices shared by DHS following the visit include:

"All participants are treated with dignity and respect and the participant is always the priority."

"Staff provide excellent customer service and are committed to serving members. DHS appreciates your ongoing efforts and commitment!"

We commend our NorthCentral FSET team for their continued commitment to providing opportunity to our FSET customers. Following the monitoring, DHS continues to request feedback from our FSET Program to support various state-level projects including system enhancements and marketing materials to share program information.

Census Update: In the month of August, we had 8 admissions and 2 readmissions. Current Memory Care census is 16 residents. Census comparison to last year:

Norwood Health Center Update by Marissa Kornack

The hospital unit (Admissions) received their unannounced CMS (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) survey the week of August 18. The last survey occurred March of 2022. I am very proud to report that we received no health citations, and just two Life Safety Code (LSC) citations. The LSC citations were related to the existing waivers we have had in place for years related to fire dampers/air plenum returns, and our elevator opening to a staircase. The cost of construction and disruption it would cause to correct these citations would be too burdensome, which is why we have requested and been granted these waivers in the past. We have requested the renewal of these waivers with the submission of our plan of correction and await a response/approval from the state and CMS.

For the congregate meal/Meals on Wheels program, we submitted our 2026 meal cost proposal to the ADRC, for which we only bid a one-year contract extension, instead of a new three-year contract. This is due to the decrease in meals in 2025 being much larger than the estimated cuts provided to us by the ADRC, which has led to increased volatility and a decrease in confidence in their projections. If our projections based on trend hold for the rest of the year, we are looking at approximately a \$100,000 reduction in revenue compared to 2025 budget, which we have had to work to offset through reducing labor and supply expenses. Additionally, due to the large volume decrease, our costs continue increasing year to year, putting the possibility of future contracts with the ADRC in jeopardy because the cost per meal could become unreasonable due to the overhead costs associated with our operation. Following the submission of our proposal, Food Services Supervisor Burt, Assistant Administrator Haanstad, and I recently met with ADRC staff Ronda James and Mike Rhea to discuss our proposal and the factors at play.

Norwood Nursing Department by Liz Masanz

For nurses, we have a 60% weekender position and one casual position vacant. We still have one agency nurse on board covering the 60% weekend position. For CNAs, we have offers out for our last two benefited positions and may only have one or two vacant casual positions available. The updating of shift differentials and the addition of the weekend differential increased our applicant traffic and our ability to fill vacant positions.

We have been working with Health Direct (contracted pharmacy) on some issues with the assigned consultant pharmacist. We are expecting a new consultant pharmacist to take over the consulting in the next month.

Admissions Unit: The average census for the month of August was 9.97 and 8.13 YTD through August. Average length of stay for August was 9.86 and 8.46 YTD. There were 27 admissions and 28 discharges, with two 30-day readmissions.

The wait is over, as we finally had our CMS hospital survey, with amazing outcomes. We received no health citations, and the surveyors were very complimentary about the unit, treatment program, documentation, and the staff. We are all very proud of the hospital staff for this accomplishment.

Long Term Care: The long- term care unit had one admission and two discharges in August, with an average census of 11.35 on Crossroads and 12.87 on Pathways, and 11.96 and 13.29 YTD respectively, all of which are above budgeted census. We have four discharges moving into the community in the coming weeks and have at least four pending referrals/admissions to the unit in the next few weeks, as well.

Melanie, new head nurse, completed her two-month MDS training with Engage Consulting, and is now completing the MDS process on her own, which is going very well.

Melanie, Megan (social services coordinator), and Liz have been working on streamlining/creating efficiencies in the EHR by adding more electronic forms/assessments and evaluating charting/assessment workflows.

Norwood Dietary Department by Larry Burt

Congregate meals for the month of August were 4,427 with revenue of \$33,320. Congregate meals year to date were 37,989 (20% decrease compared YTD to last year), with revenue of \$290,150 (17.3% decrease compared YTD to last year). Meal reductions and impact on budget continue to be monitored and managed closely.

Of the 9,389 meals decrease YTD compared to August of 2024, Marshfield site makes up 68% of the decrease at 6,430. The Marshfield site also makes up \$49,083 of the total revenue decrease. Since the closing of Cedar Rail in October of 2024, the Marshfield site located at the Senior Center, has not made up the gap in meals lost due to the closing.

Norwood Maintenance Department by Lee Ackerman

CIP Updates:

Water Pipe Replacement- The design team continues to work on the design plans for this project. A call to discuss front end specifications for the bids was held on September 3rd.

Circulating Fans- The materials for the Circulating Fan Repairs project came in higher than anticipated, leaving less funds for the installation portion of that work. Should the installation costs exceed the CIP budgeted amount, the overage will be covered out of Operations budget, which will be supplemented by approximately \$16,000 in Focus on Energy incentives this year.

I reached out to PaNyia to ask if the CIP funds that were allocated for project # 20-25-005 (Laundry Water Heater, which was removed from the 2025 CIP to be addressed in the Pipe Replacement Project in 2026) could be used towards the fan installation if those costs exceeded the allotted amount and any such overage could not be covered by Operating budget. PaNyia responded that this would be allowable. Installation is set to begin in Sept.-Oct.

Passenger Elevator Repairs- This project was completed in August. The process went very well and there were no unexpected issues to address.

Badge Readers- Maintenance staff has begun to pull wire for this project, we plan to have the installation occur in September.

Other Maintenance:

Chiller- The refrigerant leak was repaired on the chiller. We are still working on issues with the chiller not communicating with the Desigo platform; we hope to address this in the next few weeks.

Cameras on the Admissions Unit- Maintenance has most of the wire pulled for this project and we plan to have the cameras installed in September.

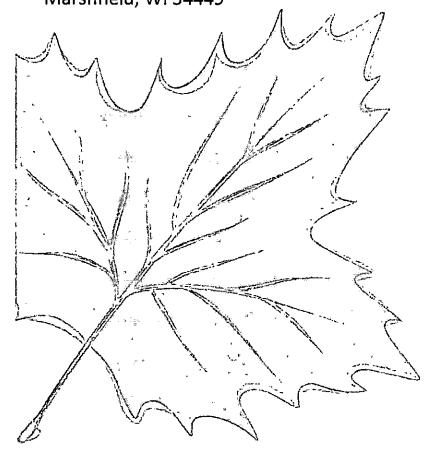

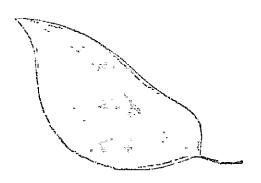

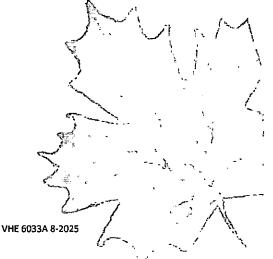

INTENT & SYNOPSIS: To request additional state funding to offset the federal funding cuts to counties for administration of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Food Share in the State of Wisconsin.

FISCAL NOTE: No cost to Wood County.

WHEREAS, the federal budget reconciliation package enacted in July of 2025, makes changes to the SNAP (FoodShare) program that would reduce federal costs and significantly impact county-administered services; and

WHEREAS, these changes extend SNAP work requirements to individuals up to age 64, lower the child age threshold for parent exemptions, and eliminate waivers for areas with high unemployment, thereby increasing referrals to the FoodShare Employment and Training (FSET) program and workload for county human service departments; and

WHEREAS, the legislation requires states to contribute a minimum of 5% toward the cost of SNAP benefits if their error rate is 6% or higher, facing penalty funding of between 5% and 15% of total SNAP costs; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin's current SNAP payment error rate is 4.47%, but without additional investment in eligibility and administrative systems, heightened workloads could push the state above the 6% threshold, triggering significant penalties; and

WHEREAS, if Wisconsin's error rate reaches 6% on or after October 1, 2027, the state's 5% cost share would be approximately \$69 million annually, with potential penalty payments increasing the state's financial burden—costs that could ultimately cascade down to counties; and

Adopted by the County Board of Wood County, October 21, 2025

WHEREAS, the SNAP administrative match rate for Income Maintenance (IM) activities has been reduced from the previous 50% federal / 50% state-local to 25% federal / 75% state-local, substantially reducing federal revenue available to counties to administer SNAP; and

WHEREAS, the reduction in administrative funds could lead to a reduction in IM staff, which could result in an increased payment error rate; and

WHEREAS, county IM administrative costs are approximately \$123 million annually, with SNAP-related workload accounting for about \$49 million of those costs; and

WHEREAS, the new administrative match rate results in an estimated \$17 million annual loss in SNAP administrative funding to counties; and

WHEREAS, these federal cuts result from shifting the benefit and administrative costs to states and counties (reducing resources available for local administration), tightening work requirements (increasing county workload), and penalizing minor payment errors (resulting in more cost to the states); and

WHEREAS, counties operate under state-imposed property tax levy limits, restricting their ability to offset such funding losses without additional state or federal relief, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Wood County Board of Supervisors urges the State of Wisconsin to provide funding to offset the county fiscal impact caused by the enacted federal SNAP changes, and to work with counties to ensure adequate resources for the administration of FoodShare and related programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Wood County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to send a copy of this Resolution to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, Wisconsin State Legislators with a constituency within Wood County, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and the Wisconsin County Human Service Association.

The suspect was not located during this search, it was believed suspect had returned inside the residence and was hiding.

- A 12-week series of strength training sessions (StrongBodies) at the Pittsville Community Center for older adults/adults in the community, where participants engage in regular, progressive strength training

and health education to improve their physical and mental health and enhance social connectedness. This series is led by two Extension StrongBodies volunteers.

- This class is full with 30 registered participants and a waitlist of 4 participants! Wood County is also excited to welcome another StrongBodies leader to our volunteer team!
- A food waste audit was conducted at Grove Elementary School in partnership with the WRPS Food Service team to identify and quantify the types and reasons for food waste in the cafeteria. Two food waste audits were held one week apart. After the first audit, a new share cart was introduced into the

cafeteria with an update cart and branding to bring better awareness to the share cart for students to use! Share carts help to reduce food waste by allowing students to donate uneaten, unopened food to classmates who are still hungry and helps combat food insecurity by providing nutritious foods at no cost to students.





HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

Ka Zoua Thao, Bilingual (Hmong) Community Health Worker

- A bi-monthly support group for Hmong elementary students in grades four and five, where they learn
 about feelings, safety, and respect through storytelling, art, and guided conversations. Using ageappropriate terms, basic concepts of mental health, personal boundaries, and trusted adults while
 honoring Hmong traditions and values will be introduced. Through this program, Hmong students will
 feel safe, heard, and confident to lay the foundation for lifelong emotional well-being and opening the
 door to healthier conversations in their families and communities.
 - Total Reach: 7 students in grades four and five
- A bi-weekly meeting for Hmong middle and high school students to engage in open conversations, cultural storytelling, and guided activities to learn about mental health, domestic violence, and sexual assault within the Hmong community. They gain tools to recognize signs of trauma, understand healthy boundaries, and access support systems all in a safe, judgement-free environment. Through this effort, we are fostering a generation of informed, compassionate youth who feel seen, heard, and empowered to break cycles of silence and advocate for healing and change in their families and communities.
 - Total Reach: 33 students in grades 6-8
 - Total Reach: 8 students in grade 9-12
- A Tai Chi class for older adults and individuals with arthritis, where participants learn gentle, low-impact
 movements designed to improve balance, flexibility, and joint health. Through this activity, the program

help reduce the risk of falls and empower participants to lead healthier, more active lives, fostering independence and confidence in their daily routines.

- o Total Reach: 20 participants
- Building relationships and engaging with partners to address health needs with the Hmong community within Wood County.
- Ongoing one-on-one meetings with Hmong clients, where resources and referrals are made. Through these efforts, individual clients are able to receive support navigating through the healthcare and legal systems and get connected with community resources.
 - o **Total Reach:** 13 one-on-one clients
- The Hmong Women's Social Space serves as a monthly gathering for Hmong women to engage in discussions about often overlooked topics within their community. This initiative aims to foster relationships among participants and empower them to advocate for the recognition of their voices.
 - o Total Reach: 8 participants

HORTICULTURE

Janell Wehr, Horticulture Educator

• A diagnostic service for the general public, where Marathon and Wood County residents' horticultural inquiries are answered through evidence-based resources. This effort is designed to reduce pollution through horticultural product (pesticides and fertilizers) misuse.

HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS & DEVELOPMENT

Ben Eberlein, Human Development & Relationships Educator

- A direct education program for high school juniors and seniors in which we help youth build independent living skills.
 - o **Total Reach:** 57 students
- A coaching program for families and individuals, where participants learn how to create financial goals
 and gain money management skills. The goal of this program is to enable participants to prepare for and
 take charge of household financial situations that occur due to changes in income or unforeseen
 hardships.
 - o **Total Reach:** One 60-minute session with one individual.
- A 6-session course for renters where participants learn how to find and apply for rental housing, understand their responsibilities as a renter, how to communicate effectively with their landlords, and manage housing expenses. Through this, those with negative rental records and those new to renting are able to increase their ability to find and keep safe affordable housing, thereby increasing their stability and decreasing their reliance on public supports.
 - o **Total Reach**: 4 individuals met for three 2-hour sessions.

 stakeholders to come together at a one-day event to discuss nutrient loss reduction strategy actions
 that can help inform and guide an updated state nutrient loss reduction strategy.
- A meeting with stakeholders to develop a monitoring plan for the Nepco Lake watershed, that will outline
 plans for gathering data that can help inform management decisions in the watershed and activities of
 the Nepco Lake District in the future.
 - o **Total Reach:** 10 Stakeholders from the Nepco Lake Watershed
- Facilitation of monthly meetings of the Wood County Citizen Water Groups, where stakeholders meet
 to discuss ways to implement their annual action plan, learn about water related issues in Wood County,
 plan events and activities, update each other on work being done in Wood County, and identify new
 collaborations for future work/projects.
 - o Total Reach: 15 Citizen Members of the Wood County Citizen Water Group
- A facilitated discussion for Farmers of the Roche-A-Cri, a producer-led watershed protection group, where members collaboratively identified goals, objectives, cost-share programs, and outreach activities for their 2026 Producer-Led grant application through Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. Through this activity, participants gained strategic clarity on priority efforts to pursue, with the overarching goal of improving water quality in the Big and Little Roche-A-Cri watersheds. This discussion is designed to strengthen the group's capacity to implement impactful conservation practices and enhance community engagement around watershed health.
- A presentation for the Portage County Agriculture and Extension Committee, where Anna Mitchell and Guolong Liang shared their education and outreach efforts in Portage County. Through this presentation, committee members gained insight into the relationships Anna and Guolong have



cultivated within the county's agricultural community, and how those connections have supported conservation focused education and outreach initiatives aimed at improving water quality. This presentation is designed to build awareness and support for ongoing efforts focused on improving water quality through farmer-led and on-farm solutions.

- A meeting with Nepco Lake District, where members reviewed results from a stakeholder engagement survey and outlined the strategic planning process. Through this meeting, participants learned how to incorporate community feedback into planning efforts, ensuring diverse perspectives are considered in decision making. This meeting is designed to foster inclusive and informed strategic planning, laying the groundwork for future meetings and conversations that will guide the Lake District's long-term goals and initiatives.
- An educational station for Nekoosa High School environmental science students during a field trip in
 the 14 Mile Watershed, where students engaged in a watershed board game. Through this activity,
 students learned about different watersheds and explored how human actions and land use decisions
 impact water quality and overall watershed health. This activity is designed to build environmental
 literacy and foster stewardship among youth by connecting classroom concepts to real-world
 conservation challenges.
 - o **Total Reach:** 29 students in grades ten, eleven, and twelve
- Planning for Science by the River, a free, one-day, outdoor event for community members of all ages from Wood County and surrounding areas. The goal of this event is to celebrate science and the outdoors through Discovery Stations that explore different fields of science through information, demonstrations, and hands on learning opportunities. Through this event, attendees will learn about opportunities to engage in science and conservation related organizations and will gain a better understanding of science and conservation efforts within their communities.

1. Economic Development (Jason Grueneberg)

Wood County Housing Repair Program – On September 8th I met with Heather Gehrt to coordinate the close out of the Wood County Housing repair program. These efforts are being guided by and coordinated with the Wisconsin Department of Administration (DOA) Division of Energy, Housing and Community Resources (DEHCR). County Treasurer Gehrt will continue to process loan payments on existing loans and transfer funds to the State.

Conservation, Education, and Economic Development (CEED) Tour — The annual CEED Tour was held on Friday, September 12th. This year's educational tour was a great success that highlighted some of the projects that the Planning & Zoning Department, Land & Water Conservation Department, and UW Extension have been involved with. Over 20 people participated in the tour and some highlights included the "Triangle Development", Jim Freeman Boat launch in Nekoosa, the mapping of Powers Bluff, Hauke Honey Corporation, and Snyder 4-H Club. A big thank you to Victoria Wilson for coordinating the tour, staff for presenting at each stop, and the Wood County CEED Committee for sponsoring the tour.

Central Wisconsin Economic Development Fund (CWED) – On September 17th I participated in the CWED Board of Directors' Meeting. Some of the agenda items included 2025-2026 Budget approval, loan activity and financial reports, review of a Start Up Ioan application, and Administrator/Service Provider report. Loan activity with CWED is very high right now with 17 Ioan applications in the pipeline.

Triangle Block Development – All of the remaining buildings on the Triangle Block have been razed. With the buildings gone, we will continue to work with the City of Wisconsin Rapids on implementing the Development Agreement that was approved on August 19th. Some of the next steps will include vacating Market St., relocating utilities, amending the Courthouse Planned Development District, and design of the County parking lot.

County Planner – The County Planner position will be posted until October 27th. I am hoping that we have some qualified applicants apply so that we can conduct interviews in early November. In the meantime, I will continue to take care of Planner job responsibilities and pause a few projects until the department is fully staffed.

I would encourage all of the board members to share that post if you are able to.

On 9/15/2025 the Branch 4 Audio Visual upgrades along with HVAC upgrades began. We have not had to rearrange courtroom use as the judge had a planned vacation during that time. On September 29th, the Branch 3 upgrades will begin so we will be utilizing the reserve courtroom or another courtroom during that two weeks. We will be having additional signage up for litigants during this time so parties are aware of the appropriate room they should appear in.

On 9/16/2025 Four staff members attended the Dementia training at Riverblock. They found the information extremely interesting and were happy they attended the session. I also received a resignation from Abigail Ashbeck. She will be moving out of the area and is unable to make the extended drive, especially during the winter months. We will miss her greatly but wish her all the best in her new adventures! The request for hire form has been completed and I hope to have that posted soon. During the month of September, I assisted representatives from the Wood County Library Board with an initial discussion, formulation and review of proposed bylaws. The Wood County Library Board was established and operates by virtue of Wis. Stat. Ch. 43, and the Wood County Board Resolution #7, adopted in 1973. To date, the Library Board has not had formal bylaws adopted and operated pursuant to the authority granted in Wis. Stat. ss. 43.57 and 43.58. Formulating and adopting bylaws will provide valuable framework for Library Board governance (i.e. appointment of Officers and their roles), and also allows for a reconciliation and aggregating the statutory authority and duties the Board has, along with powers conferred to them, for easier reference in the future when needed.

Annual Corporation Counsel/Defense Counsel Forum:

Last month, I attended the 32nd Annual Corporation Counsel/Defense Counsel Forum in Stevens Point, WI. The conference served as a great opportunity to meet and talk with my counterparts from other counties, as well as take part in sessions of relevancy to topics my office regularly works on. Specifically, sessions regarding Public Records/Open Meetings Law, Appellate Court updates of relevancy to Corporation Counsel, zoning and land use updates, and procedural/timing considerations regarding employment-related cases handled by the Equal Rights Division (ERD) were all particularly informative and valuable to take part in.

We continue to have monthly sustainability meetings with representatives from the district attorney's office, the division of community corrections, the state public defender, the criminal justice department, and with our treatment court judge. The conversation centers around all aspects of sustainability but varies from month to month. August's meeting resulted in several recommendations that I have been looking into for the last 30 days. It is worth noting that September's meeting is cancelled due to conflicts in the schedule of the treatment court judge and the criminal justice coordinator. We will meet as scheduled in October.

TAD funding has been announced for 2026, and Wood County has the opportunity to apply for the same amount of federal funding as we did in 2025. I look to receive federal funding in the same areas of my budget as in 2025, and my cash match portion of the grant also should look very similar to 2025. I am

currently working on collecting the necessary supporting documents for the application, and then I will be working on a final budget and a submission of the grant (it is due October 2nd).

Jail Programming (STRONG):

Medication Assisted Treatment Program (MARP):

Current Participants: 30 Year to date participants: 107

Jail Residential Treatment Program (RSAT):

Current Participants: 7

The residential treatment program continues through its second cycle in the new facility. As per usual, we have lost some participants along the way. Some were removed due to behaviors, but just as many left due to moving on from the facility. Some of our treatment pod participants reach their discharge date prior to getting to finish, and others get sent to treatment through probation and parole with little warning (and that has always been the case). The Department of Justice has given us the opportunity to extend our current grant through September of 2026 (originally it was supposed to end October 1st, 2025). They also offered us a 100,000-dollar expansion on the grant to continue the work that we have been doing. Furthermore, they have stated that they will have another contract available once we finish spending the expansion money on this one. All of this leads me to believe that they are committed to continuing to support our jail residential treatment program here in Wood County. In the coming weeks I will create a budget for the expansion, but I expect that the majority of it will be spent to support existing staff, existing contracts with treatment providers and peer support, and medication costs.

A large portion of our jail programming is funded by an Opiate Settlement Fund allotment from DHS. This allotment ran from July 2024-June 2025 and we have finally received our final spend-down amount from our previous contract. We will be utilizing these 142,847 dollars to create a new contract from July of 2026-June of 2027. I have a little over one week to create a budget for this, and I anticipate that it will be used to mostly support existing staff, existing contracts, and to pay for some medication costs for our MARP program.

Other Matters:

Our team participated in another community outreach opportunity, along with Three Bridges Recovery, at the Thursday Farmer's Market here in Wisconsin Rapids on 9/11/2025. We are scheduled to make one more appearance next month. This gives my staff and recovery coaches from Three Bridges Recovery an opportunity to discuss our various programs, harm reduction information, and information about peer support and recovery coaching with individuals from the community.

The County has announced that they are accepting applications for the next round of County Opioid Settlement Dollars. We did receive funding from this source in 2025, and I hope to obtain funding again in 2026 in this area. I have not yet determined which specific programs or areas I would like to apply this funding to.

As this report reflects, I have several opportunities to secure funding for my department's programs right now. I anticipate that the next couple of weeks will mostly be spent completing all of the necessary applications and budget extensions in order to make that a reality.

There was one trial in the last month. ADA Zima obtained a conviction for OWI 5th and Disorderly Conduct as Domestic Abuse in a trial before Judge Jerabek.

Since the last report, the District Attorney attended the Department Head Meeting on August 27, 2025. Additionally, on September 4, 2025, the District Attorney attended a Department of Justice Data Projects Feedback meeting through Microsoft Teams. This meeting was to discuss the current case managing software used statewide and possible changes and revisions being recommended. On September 5, 2025, the District Attorney and ADA Michael Montgomery met with the supervisors in the Department of Human Services Family Services Division to coordinate on CHIPS and Juvenile Justice processes. On September 9, 2025, the District Attorney presented at before this committee int eh budget review process and also attended the Judges' Meeting over the lunch hour. On September 10, 2025, the District Attorney attended the Wood County Mental Health Court Quarterly Meeting. On September 16, 2025, the District Attorney attended the monthly meeting of the Wood Count Board of Supervisors.

Between August 29, 2025 and the filing of this report, there have been 243 charges referred to this office. 159 of those have been reviewed and filed as appropriate. 53 cases are still being reviewed for possible charges. Additionally, this office has created and put in place a Policy and Procedure Manual for the first time.

ADA Michael Montgomery started with the office on August 25, 2025. ADA Lisa Temich started with the office on September 8, 2025. At this point the office has a full staff of Assistant District Attorneys. We did have the loss of Victim Witness Coordinator Alicia Parenteau who had her last day on September 11, 2025. Additionally, Kim Thurber (Legal Assistant) left to take a position with the Public Defender's Office. We have begun interviews and hope to have both positions filled shortly. The District Attorney's Office is also taking applications for the two new ADA positions that will be assigned to Wood County starting October 5, 2025 as part of the new State Budget.

Subject: Commissioner Report for October 2, 2025, HIRC meeting

Department Activities

Personnel/Administration

The Highway Department currently has no vacancies.

The Commissioner proposes revising the access policy as discussed at the September HIRC to incorporate the same building setback distances as described in the Planning & Zoning Land Division Ordinance.

Highway staff are working with IT and Delasoft in preparation for a new online permitting software. Anticipate the new program to go live in November or December 2025.

Commissioner and staff have been working on the proposed 2026 budget and project list. We are considering revisions to maintenance plan and impacts to level of service.

A Grand Rapids resident purchased a property through a sheriff's sale next to Lake Wazeecha Park property. The previous owners installed a septic field that is partially on County owned land. The County parcel was obtained in 1946 for "street purposes." The resident has requested the Highway Department and/or Park Department to consider selling a portion of this parcel (currently vacant) so the property owner's septic can be on privately owned land. Commissioner is working with Corporation Council to find a way to resolve the issue.

Wisconsin Department of Transportation is evaluating intersection alternatives for 8th Street and Griffith Ave, (Wis 13 & CTH Z). Options being evaluated will require both the County and City of Wisconsin Rapids to have some cost sharing. The project is currently scheduled for construction in 2027.

EQUIPMENT

A new high-capacity brine maker will by installed at the Marshfield facility likely in November 2025. WisDOT is providing 100% of the funding to purchase the brine maker and equipment.

Construction Projects

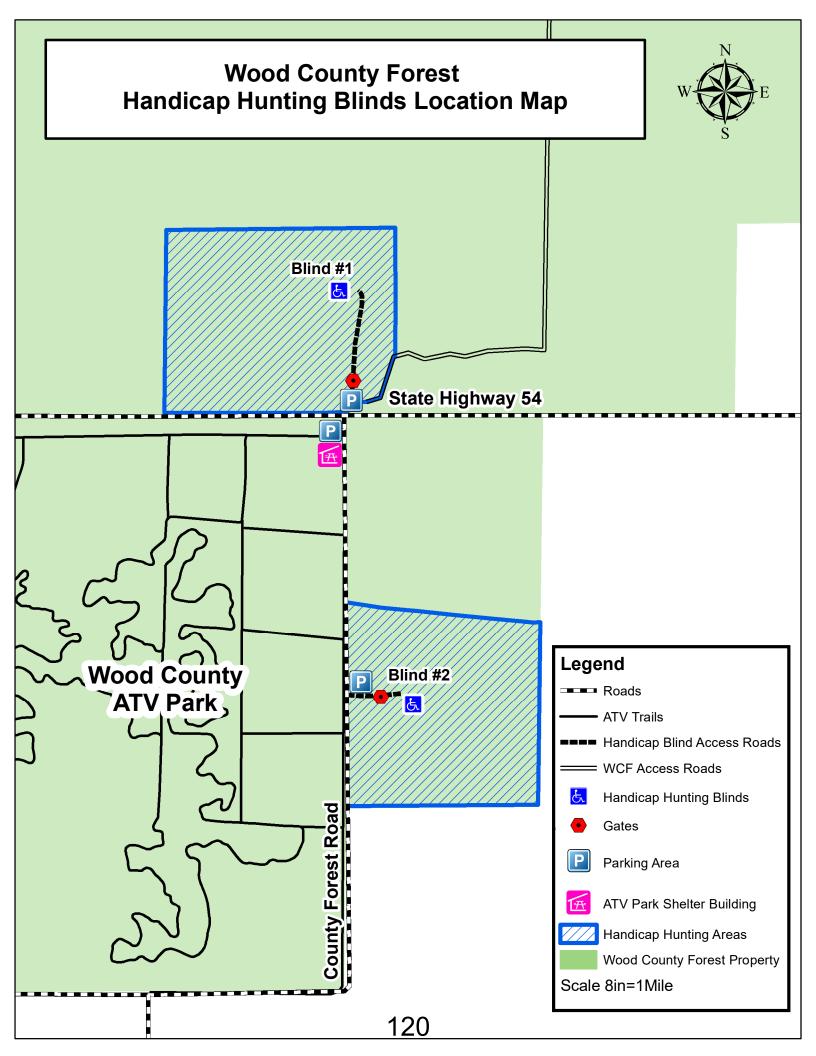

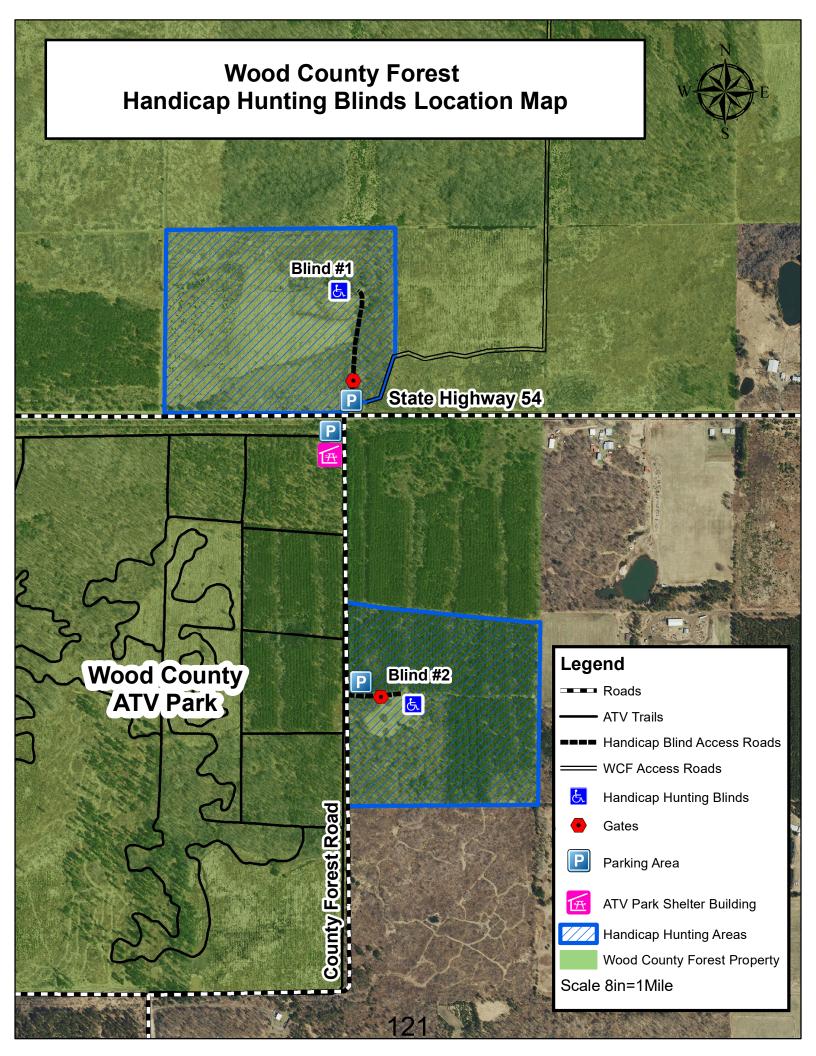
- Timber Sales: Two active timber sales in September. Although some mills have curtailed deliveries due to maintenance and repairs, logging activity may increase in the next couple months once their maintenance is completed and wood consumption increases (weather permitting).
- Worked with Nick Flanagan Corp. Counsel on Accessible Hunting Blind Policy and land trade proposal discussed at September HIRC. Materials for both are included in HIRC packet.
- Timber sale establishment in compartment 37.
- Worked with snowmobile coordinator on trail reroute in Wood County Forest.
- Forestry Technician: Cleaned and mowed shooting range. Painted forestry gates. Skid steer maintenance and repairs. Mowed county forest roads and trails. Improved /graded Hazelnut Trail including delivery of 15 loads of road base. Began work on snowmobile trail reroute.

ACCESSIBLE HUNTING BLIND RULES AND RESERVATION POLICY

- <u>Location:</u> Wood County has two Accessible Hunting Blinds which may be reserved by filling out an application. The hunting blind locations are both west of the intersection of CTH G and STH 54 and are depicted on a map accompanying the application. Applications must designate which blind they wish to reserve.
- Reservation and Rules: Hunters wishing to reserve a blind must complete an Accessible Hunting Blind Application. Reservations may be made on-line, by phone, or in the Parks and Forestry office at 111 W. Jackson Street, Wisconsin Rapids 8am-4pm M-F. The following rules shall apply to hunting blind reservations:
 - o Hunters wishing to reserve a blind are required to possess a Wisconsin DNR Class A, B, C, or D Hunting Disability Permit.
 - o Blinds are reservable for dates coinciding with any Wisconsin Deer or Turkey season. Blinds are not reservable for any other timeframe.
 - o The reservation fee is \$20.00/day and <u>is not refundable.</u> Payment can be made with cash, check, or credit card.
 - Reservations are on a first come first served basis and can be made for up to two consecutive days maximum. The same individual may not make back-to-back reservations. Reservations by the same individual shall be separated by a minimum of two days.
 - o Reservations are based on a 24-hour clock, start at 00:00 and end at 24:00. Blinds may be occupied at any time within the reservation period.
 - o Blinds may be reserved up to one year in advance. Consecutive days may be reserved up to one year in advance of the initial day.
- <u>Cancellation Policy:</u> There will be no refunds for cancellations. However, hunters who find themselves unable to keep their reservations are encouraged to cancel in consideration of others who may want to use the blind(s). Cancellations may be accomplished on-line, by phone, or in the Parks and Forestry office at 111 W. Jackson Street, Wisconsin Rapids 8am-4pm M-F.
- <u>Capacity and Guest Limitations:</u> Reservations allow one hunter and up to two hunter's assistants maximum. The hunter is the only person allowed to utilize a firearm, bow, or crossbow in the blind.
- **Hunting Area:** Permitted hunter must hunt from the established blind or immediately adjacent to it.
- Animals: All animals are prohibited in the blind except service animals that are reasonably necessary for the applicant. Service animals shall be under the immediate control of the person in need of service at all times. Animals are allowed outdoors if they are under the immediate control of an adult by a leash that shall not exceed six feet in length at full extension.
- **Responsibilities:** Permitted hunter is responsible for possessing appropriate licenses and permits, knowing and understanding all appropriate hunting regulations and hunting during appropriate dates and times.
- <u>County Forest Use:</u> The hunting area is part of the Wood County Forest. The public does have the right to use all areas of the County Forest, but they do not have the right to intentionally disrupt the hunting experience.

- <u>Parking:</u> Only one vehicle is allowed within designated hunting areas (i.e. behind gates). Parking is available in the public parking area outside gates but must not block route through gates. Personal mobility devices used as a transport aid do not require a permit for use within designated hunting areas by those who have reserved a blind.
- Access to Blind: Access of the blind will be locked with a combination lock. The combination to open it will be given at the time of reservation. Access Gates are to be closed and locked when blinds are unoccupied.
- Revocation and/or Removal: The County, in its discretion, may revoke any rental agreement for any violation of the Agreement, order the Lessee and all guests/invitees to leave the accessible blind area immediately, and seek law enforcement assistance for noncompliance.
- Alcohol: Individuals may not consume any form of alcohol when using the hunting blind or engaged in any other activities associated with the hunting blind. Violation of this provision will result in revocation of a permit and being asked to leave the blind and/or hunting area and may result in a bar from use of the hunting blind and denial of future applications for its use.
- <u>Blind Care and Damages:</u> Individuals are responsible for any cleanup and welfare of the blinds and surrounding area. Additionally, users are required report any damage to the facilities by said users. Users are also encouraged to report any damage or inadequacies noted upon entry to the blind/facility.

INTENT & SYNOPSIS: To amend Access Ordinance #401, Highway Access Control Ordinance to include building setback lines.

FISCAL NOTE: None

WHEREAS, the current Access Ordinance #401 does not include building setback lines.

WHEREAS, the current Zoning Ordinance No. 701 Land Subdivision covers building setback lines on newly divided land.

WHEREAS, building set back limits are needed to ensure that buildings do not encroach on the highway right-of-way to maintain safety for the traveling public, provide space for essential utilities, provide space for vehicles stored on driveways, and provide space to maintain drainage and snow storage.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, that the Wood County Board of Supervisors hereby adopts the proposed amendments to Wood County Highway Access Control Ordinance #401, adding Chapter 401-6 Setback Lines.

Chapter 401-6 Setback Lines **Building Setback Lines**

Building setback lines shall conform to the requirements of the

- 19 Leichtnam, B applicable zoning ordinance or the following, whichever is more restrictive.
 - A. Federal and State Highways. One hundred-ten (110) feet from the center line of the highway or fifty (50) feet from the right-of-way line, whichever is greater.
 - B. County Highways. Seventy-five (75) feet from the centerline of such highway or forty-two (42) feet from the right-of-way line, whichever is greater.

- C. Town Roads. Sixty-three (63) feet from the centerline of such highway or thirty (30) feet from the right-of-way line, whichever is greater.
- D. Visual Clearance Triangle.
 - 1. In each quadrant of every public street intersection there shall be a visual clearance triangle per Zoning Ordinance 701-34.
 - a. At intersections with speeds of thirty-five (35) miles per hour or greater in both directions of travel, the visual clearance triangle shall be determined by measuring sixty (60) feet along the property line for any "uncontrolled" traffic (not regulated by stop sign) and thirty (30) feet along the property line for any "controlled" traffic (regulated by stop sign).
 - b. At intersections with speeds of less than thirty-five (35) miles per hour in either direction of travel the visual clearance triangle shall extend fifteen (15) feet along the lot line in all directions of travel.
 - 2. Objects permitted within highway setback lines and visual clearance triangles:
 - a. Open fences.
 - b. Utility poles and lines, and portable equipment.
 - c. The planting and harvesting of field crops, shrubbery and trees except that no trees or shrubbery shall be planted within a visual clearance triangle so as to obstruct the view.
 - d. Corner lots shall meet building setbacks from both streets.

E. Penalties

1. Failure to comply with setback limits can result in a penalty of not less than \$50 and not more than \$500 pursuant to and in accordance with Wisconsin Statute ss. 66.0113 and 86.07(2)(a).

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Wood County Highway Ordinance #401 as amended by this action become effective upon passage and posting as required by statute.

INTENT & SYNOPSIS: To acquire land for addition to the Wood County Forest in exchange for land currently enrolled in the County Forest Program, and to seek Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources approval of the proposed addition and withdrawal of Wood County Forest Land.

FISCAL NOTE: In addition to the land exchange, Wood County will pay the trading partner \$9,100.00 based on the appraised land value. Wood County will be responsible for paying associated closing and recording fees.

WHEREAS, Nekoosa Marsh Road Cranberry LLC (NMRC) has operations adjacent to the Wood County Forest; and

WHEREAS, NMRC has proposed a land trade with Wood County in which they would acquire 20 acres of Wood County Forest Land located in the Town of Seneca, in exchange for 46.95 acres of land which they own in the Town of Dexter; and

WHEREAS, NMRC has proposed a 2:1 ratio of value in favor of Wood County based on qualified land appraisals; and

WHEREAS, NMRC has ordered and paid for said land appraisals which value the 20-acre Wood County parcel at \$60,000 and the 46.95-acre parcel at \$129,100; and

WHEREAS, sufficient funds exist in the non-lapsing County Forest Land Fund account 243-2100-34112-000-000 in order pay \$9,100.00 to achieve the 2:1 ratio previously stated; and

WHEREAS, removal and enrollment of said lands are subject to WDNR approval as established in Wisconsin Statute 28.11; and

WHEREAS, the Wood County Highway Infrastructure and Recreation Committee has studied this land trade proposal and considered the recommendation of Wood County Forest Administrator and believes it to be in the County's best interest to pursue.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Wood County Board of Supervisors accepts the recommendation of the Wood County Forest Administrator and the Wood County Highway Infrastructure and Recreation Committee and hereby approves the ownership exchange as proposed herein, contingent upon approval of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources approving the removal and enrollment of said property in the County Forest Law program. To effectuate the trade, the Board of Supervisors:

- A. Authorize and direct the Wood County Forest Administrator to submit applications to WDNR for withdrawal of the 20-acre parcel from, and entry of the 46.95-acre parcel into the County Forest program.
- B. Authorize and direct the Wood County Clerk and County Board Chairperson to execute all legal documents necessary to complete the transaction mentioned above and enroll the newly acquired property into County Forest Law pursuant to Chapter 28.11(4) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

- 3. The minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed. Motion by Hamilton/Penzkover to accept them as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 4. The Information Technology vouchers were reviewed. Motion by Brehm/Hamilton to approve as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 5. The IT Report was reviewed and discussed.
- 6. Supervisor Brehm highlighted his attendance at the NACo Al Conference in Hennepin County, Minnesota, which he and two IT staff members attended.
- 7. The AI Policy Draft was reviewed. Motion by Hamilton/Brehm to approve the policy as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 8. IT Director Kaup gave an update to the committee on the 2026 IT budget. No action taken.
- 9. The Maintenance vouchers were reviewed. Motion by Brehm/Hamilton to approve as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 10. The Maintenance Report was reviewed and discussed.
- 11. Facilities Manager Van Tassel gave an update to the committee on the 2026 Maintenance budget. No action taken.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

September 2025

- 1. Staff continue to work on items related to the Law Enforcement Center occupancy. The network team reconfigured the network for the new jail to allow for a physical key switch to be installed between the Wood County network and the Detention networks. This will allow isolation of the Detention networks, unless the key switch is intentionally turned to allow access to vendors and Wood County staff for troubleshooting or maintenance purposes. This configuration also makes the network more redundant by creating multiple paths between all of the network switches.
- 2. Started working on making sure all devices are upgraded to Windows 11 as Windows 10 will be end of life soon. Configuration templates and documentation have been created. Updates to devices have begun.
- 3. Worked with HR to complete the County's Cyber Insurance renewal form.
- 4. Implementation phase continues for a project for the Highway Department to replace the current Highway permit system with Delasoft vendor software. Research is scheduled concerning an app requested by Highway staff that will assist in tracking Catepillar equipment.
- 5. Network staff worked to identify GIS files that were removed from a share and restored them to the original location.
- 6. A new IT request form and procedure has been developed and implemented to improve handling user requests to recover accidentally deleted data. Data recovery often consumes excessive IT staff resources and the new procedure should help mitigate that resource loss.
- 7. Worked with Sheriff's Admin and staff to replace numerous cell phones. This included transferring data from old phones and configuring the new devices.
- 8. The Wood County firewalls and management server were patched to address some critical issues that were disclosed on the morning of 9/26/25.



- 9. IT staff begin work to outline and document proper procedures and best practices for system administration, especially in regard to server and application maintenance and\or upgrades that may affect accessibility and functionality.
- 10. Programming staff continue support and system functionality improvement coding for the ESS, employee self-service portal, system for payroll reports and employee benefits open enrollment. Preparations for 2026 open enrollment are complete.
- 11. Progress continues to be made on the Courthouse network refresh project. This project is one of the CIP projects that was approved for this year. There is one set of switches that need to be placed at the Courthouse and a set of switches configured for placement at Riverblock. Migration at Riverblock will need to occur over a weekend due to the number of devices that rely on the hardware.
- 12. Network staff worked to restore the high speed network connection between Riverblock and the Courthouse after the router experienced a critical error. Replacement equipment capable of the high capacity was received a few days later and immediately put in place after business hours.
- 13. Assisting Port Edwards with new server and O365 migration to transition out-of-date systems to supported operating systems. This Includes updated end-user computing devices for staff and Trustees.
- 14. Network staff continue to work with the Communications Department on the radio upgrade project. The vendor was onsite for installation the week of June 16th. Network staff had taken steps to meet requirements as outlined and provided remote access to verify. Upon switchover, issues were found by the vendor. Staff continue to work with the Communications Department and vendors to address these before the next switchover is scheduled. Staff worked with a vendor to ensure the network is properly configured for the Radio over IP project. Documentation and testing results have been provided to the radio vendor. Once the vendor is satisfied with results Go-Live will be scheduled.
- 15. Network staff continue work to draft and update Network Diagrams and a Network Map Topology for official IT use and assisting with current and future networking projects.
- 16. Upgrades to the Cradlepoint mobile routers in the squad vehicles have been pushed out. These are required for continued support coverage and bug fixes.



- 17. Monitoring daily software installs for all computers managed by Desktop Central. Removed unapproved or questionable software as needed.
- 18. Provided support for Finance staff as 2026 Budget work continues.
- 19. Completed rollout of Software Restriction Policy to all IT staff, effectively blocking software installation in known exploitable locations, massively shrinking the potential for users to install unapproved software either on purpose or by consequence of visiting a malicious internet site. Planning the rollout of this system to other departments in the near future.
- 20. Triaged and followed up with 28 alerts from the County's end point protection system. Manually investigated and cleaned up each detection and worked with the vendor as needed. In every instance, when an alert was triggered the end point protection system quarantined and stopped the process until an investigation could be completed.
- 21. Investigated 5 alerts received from the County's SIEM, Security Information and Event management system. In each instance, IT staff reached out to the user in question to verify if the attempt was legitimate.
- 22. Staff continue to work with CIS, Countywide law enforcement software, on a request for an interface to transmit electronic referrals to the DA's office.
- 23. The IT Security Team continues the Security Awareness Program. Second quarter training was assigned and completion was monitored. Accounts were disabled and\or enabled with minimal access for users who failed to complete training.
- 24. Members of our team have been virtually attending mentoring meetings with leaders in the cybersecurity area, as arranged by the MS-ISAC (Multi-State Information Sharing and Analysis Center). This includes monthly update meetings with the State of Wisconsin CRT (Cyber Response Team).
- 25. Researched, evaluated, and identified a replacement dictation software for Human Services. Licenses have been purchased and the new Dragon Professional software has been installed.



- 26. Al usage guidelines have been outlined and terms of use agreement forms made available. Users can now request Al access. Al general access is blocked. An Al policy is being drafted and was shared with HR and HR has provided valuable feedback. A draft policy will be brought to PIT for review at the October meeting.
- 27. Employees submitted approximately 170 phishing emails to IT for review. Each submittal was reviewed. Several were identified as legitimate phishing attempts. Filters were put in place to disallow mail from known phishing senders.
- 28. The vendor who provides laundry and housekeeping services for Edgewater and Norwood will be upgrading the software on the timeclocks used by their employees. Network staff identified the areas and network access currently being provided to the timeclocks to ensure that the upgrades can be completed successfully.
- 29. Programming staff work to improve support documentation for the Sage HRMS, Human Resources Management System, system for employee benefit and payroll data. Programming staff work to compose an RFP for replacement systems for HRMS and payroll is nearly complete.
- 30. Sage HRMS related servers have been upgraded to Server 2019 to support the Q3 2025 release.
- 31. Worked with CIS Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) software to be able to download crash citations from TraCS to RMS, records management system. Instructions have been sent to each agency and added to the Central Records SharePoint site. The upload transfer went live August 26th and the crash forms are now being imported into CIS.
- 32. Staff continue the review of the configuration of O365 to ensure the environment is properly configured, easy to use and has the proper security in place as we begin to implement SharePoint, Teams, and One Drive and work to migrate email servers to Exchange Online. The email migration process is working. Staff continue to review plans for backup and email encryption for the new environment.
- 33. Discovery phase continues and implementation phase begins for a project request from the Highway Department to replace the current Highway permit system with Delasoft vendor software. Research is scheduled concerning an app requested by Highway staff that will assist in tracking Catepillar equipment.



- 34. The Courtrooms A/V system project progress continues. This update will improve reliability for in room and video conference communication. A room to house the new equipment has been located. The vendor has completed cable installation. The data closet buildout is underway. A schedule to install new equipment begins in September and will continue throughout October. All four branches will be updated. Branch IV update was completed in September and has received positive feedback.
- 35. System\code improvement for the in-house Planning & Zoning permitting system continues.
- 36. Staff completed a project request for a Data Management Portal for the GLOVE and light/sound shield.

 The GLOVE and light/sound shield are de-escalation devices that can be used by jail staff and officers. The Data Management Portal is used to manage users, to set the date and time on the devices and to upload the device usage data
- 37. Received a project request from the Division Chief of EMS/Service Director for WR Fire Department to have WRFD ambulances dispatched similar to law enforcement units in CIS, the Countywide law enforcement software. This requires additional configuration in CIS to map out areas, activity codes and assigned units.
- 38. Continued work on forms process improvement and document storage in Information Technology leveraging Laserfiche.
- 39. Norwood and Edgewater Matrix Claims Management support continues with multi-factor authentication (MFA) migration to a new system evolving constantly. Account work for new backup procedures for Claims Management continues. Research progresses to address a request by Edgewater Haven Director to utilize AI supported software that can vet and speed up admission referral processes.
- 40. Support for GCS\Catalis property tax systems is ongoing. The former property tax software version end-of-life is set for Fall of 2024 and was on-prem, servers at Wood County. The upgraded version is cloud based. System migration and training is complete and go-live was July 15, 2024. Preparations begin for migrating the 34 municipalities to the new system by late 2025. Security and best practice research continues to address a request by the County GIS specialist for the City of Marshfield GIS specialist to obtain direct access to the County tax database.



- 41. Support for Norwood Healthcare Center and Edgewater Haven Matrix (EHR) and CART (CMS abstraction and reporting tool) software is ongoing. IT support works to improve the user reliance on IT for basic system functionality. eMAR provides ability to dispense patient medication when the EHR system is not accessible. Super user training continues and results in improved support of the EHR (electronic health record) system. Research and preparation work begins for another annual change to the reporting procedures for hospital pricing transparency required by CMS (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid).
- 42. For the month of August, 628 helpdesk requests were created, with staff completing 628 tickets and leaving 153 open requests. In addition, there are currently 185 project requests.
- 43. Support is ongoing for Cyber Recruiter upgrades and super user support, the HRMS extension system and website used for new hire applications. IT staff worked to resolve multiple serious issues that were caused by a very poorly developed error prone vendor supplied system upgrade. We plan to eliminate and replace the Cyber Recruiter\Careers software as part of the HRMS and payroll system replacement project. IT staff worked to resolve application access issues that were caused by an unplanned OS upgrade.
- 44. The TimeStar, electronic timecard and time tracking software system configuration changes is ongoing. Staff works to adjust settings as change requests continue. PBJ reports are submitted to CMS (Centers for Medicare & Medicaid) using TimeStar data for both the Edgewater and Norwood Facilities. PBJ mapping update work is scheduled so we can support new job codes.
- 45. The Register of Deeds work to upgrade multiple applications continues. IT staff escorts and assists the vendor, Fidlar Technologies, with server and application updates and maintenance on a regular basis.
- 46. The 2025 PC replacement 3rd quarter order has been received, and the 4th quarter order will be placed soon. Quarter 3 device replacements are being scheduled. Reviewing department needs for tablets and mobile devices to replace equipment due for refreshing.
- 47. Continue conversion of TCM client financial data for import into Laserfiche.
- 48. Network and the lead technician worked together to identify the new standards for the Wood County PC replacement schedule. This process is done annually to ensure that the specifications for new computers will meet the needs of our users and the software that they use.



- 49. IT staff work to schedule and upgrade various server operating systems and database management systems, SQL servers, begins a new cycle. This ongoing project that takes considerable time to plan, test, and implement.
- 50. Continue to apply numerous security patches to servers and network hardware. These updates include fixes for functionality and security patches that keep servers and network hardware as secure as possible.
- 51. Research is scheduled for a Veteran's office record system for a user request for client notifications via text messaging functionality.
- 52. IT staff is researching an Always On VPN. This will ensure that all communications from Wood County devices are secure using an encrypted connection even while connected to public or home networks. Additional options for restricting internet access are also being researched.
- 53. Staff attended the NaCO AI Central Regional Forum in Hennepin County, Minnesota. This was a two-day conference focused on artificial intelligence (AI).
- 54. Several stafff attended the GIPAW, Government Information Processing Association of Wisconsin, Fall Conference in Superior, WI. This conference helps government IT professionals from across the State share their experiences, successful resolutions and known caveats while supporting similar systems and users. Sessions included Cybersecurity Grant Program Updates & Opportunities, MS-ISAC, A Live Demonstration Inside the Dark Web, and Storage.
- 55. Discussions with Maintenance continue regarding space needs for the IT department. There is significant increase of technology being supported in the LEC and the increase of staff and services in other Departments within the County increases the demands on IT support as well. IT will need additional IT staff and space in order to properly support the County's expanded facilities, staff, software, hardware, systems and the increased reliance on technology. The IT Conference room now serves as our vendor staging area, network setup area, equipment storage and conference room. We have repurposed and triple purposed as much space as possible. IT needs more space to function properly.



POLICY STATEMENT

The Wood County Artificial Intelligence (AI) Technology Use (Policy) outlines fundamental practices and procedures that are required to provide the highest level of protection of the Wood County network, infrastructure and information.

As Wood County Government embraces technological advancements to streamline operations and enhance productivity, the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Generative Artificial Intelligence (Gen AI) has become increasingly prevalent. Al technologies, including Gen AI, offer powerful capabilities for automating tasks, generating content, and improving decision-making processes. However, to ensure the responsible and ethical use of these technologies, Wood County has established this policy to regulate their application within its operations

PURPOSE

This policy aims to regulate the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) within Wood County Government, ensuring its application adheres to data security, privacy, and ethical standards while enhancing operational efficiency.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all employees, contractors, elected officials, and any person or organization accessing Gen AI technologies or AI platforms within Wood County Government facilities or while conducting official Wood County business.

Departments are encouraged to develop internal policies that align with these standards and address the use of AI within their specific operations.

POLICY

1. Definitions:

- a) Artificial Intelligence (AI) refers to computer systems and software designed to perform tasks that typically require human intelligence. These tasks include problem-solving, decision-making, learning from experience, understanding language, and recognizing patterns.
- b) Al Platform refers to any system or application specifically designed to utilize Generative Artificial Intelligence to automate tasks or generate information.
- Al Technology refers to functionality embedded in a software package or system that utilizes
 Artificial Intelligence to perform tasks specific to the purpose or function of that system or
 software package.
- d) Generative Artificial Intelligence (Gen AI) refers to Artificial Intelligence systems capable of generating human-like text, images, or other content based on input data.
- 2. **Appropriate Use**: Any use of AI authorized under this policy must comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and Wood County policies. Users are expected to limit their use of GenAI systems to official, work-related purposes. Users should only access and use AI systems for which they have received proper authorization and training. AI-generated content should be treated as an informational tool, not a replacement for human judgment or decision-making, and should never be represented as the user's own original work. AI-generated content is considered draft material and must be thoroughly reviewed before use. Before relying on AI-generated content, users are advised to:

- a) Obtain independent sources to verify the accuracy and reliability of the information provided by AI.
- b) Review prompts and outputs for signs of bias or discrimination and take reasonable steps to mitigate these issues when feasible.
- c) Include a clear statement as needed regarding the use of AI-generated content.
- 3. **Prohibited Use**: Users are responsible for ensuring that their use of AI conforms to applicable laws and County policies, including the appropriate use guidelines found in the Technology Use Policy. In addition, users shall not:
 - a) Create accounts in their capacity as County users on any publicly available AI platform or technology unless such use has been approved by their Department Head and the IT Department.
 - b) Input content that is copyrighted or otherwise protected by law.
 - c) Use AI in a manner that does not comply with established regulations and ethical guidelines established for AI.
 - d) Generate content intended to be deceptive or misleading.
 - e) Use AI to sway public opinion or disrupt internal decision-making.
 - f) Use AI to bypass security controls or create vulnerabilities within critical infrastructure.

4. Restricted Use:

- a) Confidential data, including sensitive personal information, proprietary business data, and data considered protected, is not to be processed or generated using AI systems unless the system to be used has been approved for such use by Wood County and the appropriate data security agreements are in place.
- b) Use of Gen AI and AI platforms must comply with all applicable policies and standards established by Wood County.

5. Data Classification and Protection:

- Users must verify that no confidential information will be accessed before utilizing Gen AI technologies.
- b) In accordance with item 2 above, users utilizing Gen AI technologies within Wood County Government must ensure that any input data provided to the system does not contain confidential information.
- c) Precautions must be taken to avoid accidental exposure of sensitive data during the input process.

6. Department Head Approval:

a) Users intending to use Gen AI technologies or platforms other than those provided by Wood County, must obtain approval from their Department Head prior to initiating any Gen AI project or task.

7. Identification of Al-generated Content:

a) Users are required to disclose content created using Gen AI as such when disseminating or presenting it outside of the systems that have generated it, ensuring transparency regarding its origin.

8. Responsibility for Content:

a) The author of Al-generated documents is responsible for verifying the accuracy and appropriateness of the content generated by Gen Al and is accountable for any consequences arising from the use of such content.

9. Use of Wood County Sanctioned AI Platforms:

- a) Only systems provided, or AI platforms sanctioned, by Wood County may be used for Gen AI projects or tasks within Wood County Government.
- b) The IT Department will maintain a list of approved platforms on the IT section of the County Intranet site.
- c) User accounts created and used for access to AI must be assigned by the County or created using a Wood County email address.

10. Training:

a) All users who are granted access to Gen Al technologies within Wood County Government must undergo training on the proper use of these tools and the importance of data security and confidentiality. This training will be assigned by the IT Department.

11. Records Retention and Disclosure:

- a) Information prepared, produced, collected, received, owned, or retained by County staff in the course of their work is subject to data retention requirements.
- b) Data provided to third-party AI systems for processing must be retrievable for public disclosure or audit purposes.
- c) Staff have an obligation to maintain data entered into AI tools according to applicable data retention schedules.
- d) Records generated, used, or stored by Generative AI solutions may be considered public records and must be disclosed upon request.

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12. Review and Update:

a) This policy will be reviewed periodically to ensure its effectiveness and relevance in safeguarding confidential information while allowing for the responsible use of Gen AI technologies within the organization.

13. Compliance:

a) Failure to comply with this policy may result in disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment or contract.

14. Approval:

a) This policy is effective upon approval by the Wood County Board and will be communicated to all users and relevant stakeholders.

Ongoing Projects and Planning

Jail Project – Remaining construction is underway; the new loading dock for Courthouse and Jail deliveries is scheduled to be complete before the end of the year.

Building automation system programming and adjustments are ongoing.

Courthouse – Upcoming accessibility and parking improvements should be easier for us all to imagine now that demolition of the structures across Market Street is complete. The design and engineering process for this will require a lot of collaboration between County and City staff as well as contracted firms. I will continue working with project engineers to coordinate upcoming changes to Jackson and Second Streets that will affect the perimeter of our future parking lot.

HVAC system replacement is ongoing; the work is scheduled to be complete by the end of November. The contractor has been working on startup and programming of the new boilers; employees working in the building have been patient and accommodating of the varying temperatures. Additional work related to the HVAC system update is ongoing throughout the building including control wiring, duct work reconfiguration, and miscellaneous work as needed.

River Block – The second phase of roof replacement is complete. This has given us a much-improved building envelope and lowered the risk of water infiltration that the original design had allowed. Since completion there has been at least one significant rain event that historically would have resulted in water leaking into the building, however, the new roof membrane performed well and kept the rain outside where it belongs.

SCLS Board Report (Susan) – Susan was still in Madison and attended via Zoom. She gave an update on the migration from LibLime to SirsiDynix. Short discussion followed regarding timeframes, how library staff was affected, and final go live date, which is April 16, 2026. Various ILS systems were evaluated by SCLS staff and committees, and consensus was that SirsiDynix offered the most workable solution for our needs. SirsiDynix does seem to offer better functionality in terms of searching. Library staff system-wide will be receiving training February – March 2026.

4. New Business Library and SCLS reports:

Nekoosa (Darla) – We have had a VERY busy Summer Reading program. Megan Cremeens and I collaborated on our SLP and it has been an amazing success. We have had over 1,486 people attend our programs. Our Touch-a-Truck program which featured vehicles and staff from Alliant Energy, Nekoosa, Police Department, Nekoosa Fire Department, Nekoosa Public Works Department, Hamin Trucking, Palm Septic, Flying Fur Trucking, and Wood County Sheriff's Department welcomed over 250 people. ZooZort was another crowd favorite with well over 200 in attendance. I had to turn people away, as I was trying to be respectful of the presenter's maximum limit. Our surprise hit program was our Adopt-a-Pet program with over 160 people in attendance. Every kid got a small stuffed animal to adopt. They got to fill out adoption papers, make a collar and tag, and decorate a kennel for the pet. We used leftover beanie babies, bought some animals, and Darla's son, Sam, unknowingly donated over 30 stuffed animals to the program.

The money we saved in our programming, we allocated to purchasing the ReadSquared app through WILS. It has been AMAZING! The community really embraced the technology. We have 221 people signed up, over 77,893 minutes spent reading, and over 900 titles. Our Plinko game has been a tremendous hit, and our program winds up in late August. Each kid will be able to "build their own" grab bag of prizes. It is also worthy to note that the majority of our participants come from four communities, in equal numbers. Nekoosa, Saratoga, Town of Port Edwards, and Wisconsin Rapids residents all equally represented in our kids, teens, and adult programming.

We are well on our way to a new circulation desk! We have \$10,000 from ALA. We are very thankful for the support from Mead-Witter, with their donation of \$3,000. Incourage has set up a \$2500 matching grant. We also received \$458 from the Nekoosa Area Resident Fund and other private donations. I am in the process of writing a few more donation letters, but I feel confident in saying we will have a new ADA accessible circulation desk by Christmas. Parents continue to express appreciation for the fact that our program is "screen free" allowing their children to use imagination and individual hands-on creativity. Along with reading minutes-which are being tracked this year with age specific Lego builds, completion of these weekly activities allows all ages to participate in the prize drawings.

Arpin (Stacy) – (copied from submitted report) (continued) As with our monthly Take n' Make activity kits, we want to see children participate that might either struggle with reading or don't care to read in general; and while they might not see it as "reading," these activities and instructions are beneficial in so many ways from building reading and comprehension skills, enhancing fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination, along with critical thinking and problem solving. New this year, the teens/adults are meeting on Tuesday afternoons. This year's teen group has enjoyed creating Kintsugi Bowls, Cracked Gem Magnets, Ceramic Tile Art, Faux Stained Glass, Alcohol Ink Picture Holders, and the Finale Pictionary Party.

In addition to the Summer Program, the library continues to host The Teen & Young Adult Game Night at the Library which continues to be popular with events averaging 12 young people...and a few adults.

August finds us looking for ways to expand the shelving options for both the Young Fiction and Graphic Novel collections as well as making programming plans for the rest of the year and early 2026.

Our summer program wraps up on Saturday. It has been eight weeks of great fun. From our kickoff in early June with over 160 people attending, to our smaller crowds in July but still averaging 65, it has been busy! Tom Pease was by far the program we got the most positive feedback on! You can bet he's coming back next year. Our famous scratchy tickets were a hit again and could be earned by participating in activities like 'I Spy' and checking out books. We have 323 tickets as of this report in the prize drawings. The Teen Advisory Board was awesome this summer with such creative ideas that culminated in a teen led program that the kids loved.

Bylaws for the Wood County Library Board – Susan Feith and Darla Allen will work on a draft of Bylaws based on examples from Dane County, and Sauk County Library Board Bylaws. In addition to the standard bylaws, it was requested by the Board that Susan and Darla make sure to include how to handle absences, with Dane County Library Board Bylaws providing very specific directions. Susan and Darla were also instructed to look into possible supermajority vote to remain on the Board, given the difficulty in finding and retaining board members.

2026 Budget: Excel spreadsheet was shared with attendees. Discussion about funding formula and how the reimbursement request is determined, as well as what is left out of the funding formula. It was also clarified that this reimbursement amount is for library users who reside OUTSIDE of the municipality and do not have a library. Susan made ntoe of the percentages of circulation within the municipality and from outside of the municipality. Jill also explained the challenges Marshfield faces, as they share a border with an adjacent library system, Wisconsin Valley, and many of the surrounding towns are in either Clark or Marathon County, which would mean residents of those counties would need to pay for a library card. Discussion of deposit collection reimbursement to McMillan Memorial Library in the amount of \$398. There was no knowledge of a deposit collection to any of the other libraries from McMillan. Darla stated that Nekoosa used to receive a deposit collection of some large print and audiobooks, but that ceased around 2010. Everett Roehl Marshfield Public Library still sends deposit collections to Pittsville, Arpin, and Vesper libraries. Motion by Susan Feith with a 2nd by Brad Hamilton to remove \$398 from the McMillan Memorial Library deposit collection reimbursement. Motion passed.

1. Supervisor Hahn called the meeting to order at 10:00 AM.

2. There was no public comment.

- 3. Motion by Breu/Thao to approve the minutes of the previous meetings. Motion carried unanimously.
- 4. Van Tassel reviewed the various low-cost change orders since the last committee meeting. The item needing committee approval is on the parking structure currently being constructed. Originally, the architect was told that the parking deck should be flush with the existing second floor of the Courthouse, to allow for further expansion in the future if needed, however that did not make it through to the final plan. To make this happen, additional insulation, reinforcement and concrete is needed. In addition, in order to protect the limestone on the current Courthouse where the new parking structure attaches, a barrier is needed to ensure the safety of that limestone. The total cost is \$150,000. Motion by Hokamp/Voight to approve the change order as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
- 5. Van Tassel and representatives of the Samuels Group reviewed the current status of the construction and demolition. It was noted that the structural engineers approved the usage of the existing back wall without having to rebuild the entire structure. It will be covered in the same manner as the back of the new jail.
- 6. Supervisor Hahn adjourned the meeting at 10:33 AM.
